School sales are on so please add the needed items to your shopping lists and bring them to church. Why school supplies? To the children who receive School Kits, these supplies sometimes mean the difference between getting an education or not. Public school is usually free, but in the places where LWR works, even a few required supplies, like pens and paper, may be more than many fami-

lies can afford. And when parents can only afford to send one of their children to school, girls rarely get priority... yet the education level of mothers has the biggest impact on development. Please do not donate items with any religious symbols, a U.S. flag, patriotic or military symbols, or references to the armed forces, including camouflage. Many of these school kits go to war torn countries where the children are affected through no fault of their own. The bags are sent with no symbols for their own safety. All items should be new and in good condition. Each School Kit needs:

Four 70-sheet notebooks of wide or college-ruled paper approximately 8" X 10¹/₂"; no loose-leaf paper

One 30-centimeter ruler, or a ruler with centimeters on one side and inches on the other One pencil sharpener

One blunt scissors (safety scissors with embedded steel blades work well)

Five black or blue ballpoint pens (no gel ink); Five unsharpened No. 2 pencils with erasers

One box of 16 or 24 crayons

NEBRASKA SYNOD CELEBRATES 150 YEARS OF MISSION

It was in September, 1871 that a small group of pastors from a handful of young Lutheran congregations gathered to create a fellowship, a structure that would connect them to one another. The new entity was called the Nebraska Synod. Affiliated with the national General Synod, the original Nebraska Synod was one of several church bodies that emerged and then

merged through the next 116 years to become the Nebraska Synod ELCA. The 150th anniversary of that event will be commemorated in a variety of ways throughout the coming months,

culminating in a birthday party of sorts at the 2022 Synod Assembly. Over the course of those months, resources will be made available for congregational use to help spotlight the history and mission of the synod, and to encourage congregations to share stories of their own histories and mission.

The first formal event of the commemoration year will be Nebraska Synod Sunday, August 29, 2021. We will lift up the 150th anniversary that weekend to "start the party".

SUMMARY OF 2021 NEBRASKA SYNOD ASSEMBLY



The Nebraska Synod gathered digitally for its firstever online assembly on Saturday, June 5. Livestreamed from the television studios of the University of Nebraska Omaha, the assembly managed to share online worship, hear from presenters, conduct elections, transact business, and engage in dialog, all in a matter of six hours. The opening worship was adapted from the ELCA's com - memoration of the 50th anniversary of ordination of Lutheran women in the U.S., the 40th anniversary of the first ordnation of a woman of color, and the 10th anniversary of the ordination of persons in same-sex marriages. Former Bishop Jessica Crist of the Montana Synod was the quest preacher, and served as a keynote speaker as well, reflecting on the critical importance of lifelong learning for all disciples.

Rev. Dr. Rafael Malpica-Padilla was the ELCA Churchwide Representative and reported on all that the Nebraska Synod does nationally and globally through the many varied expressions of the ELCA's ministries. Picking up on a phrase from Bishop Maas' report in the Bulletin of Reports, he repeatedly asked whether "we will lean backward and tip over into history, or lean forward and tip over into a new future." He spoke with passion of the ways the ELCA is leaning into God's future and expressed gratitude to the Nebraska Synod for its support and leadership within the ELCA.

The Bishop's Report

Bishop Maas started out his annual report with a recap of 2020 and how the pandemic led to change. As part of this recap, he discussed Walter Brueggemann's work with the three urgent prophetic tasks- Reality, Grief, and Hope. It was inspiring to see all the hopeful ways congrega- tions were able to adapt to the reality of the pandemic and recover from grief to continue to be the church together. Bishop Maas also discussed some key topics, such as leadership in the church and the work we do with our Serving Arm partners. He ended his time by highlighting synod programs and new ministries, such as Seeking the Spirit Within, the Church of the Way, and the Vitality Initiative for Congregations. Other Highlights

Opening worship featured many of our female leaders from across the synod. Pastors, deacons, and lay leaders from Nebraska congregations took part in leading this celebration of women in the church. Rev. Jessica Crist from the Montana Synod gave a sermon about women being called to preach.
