Peace and Global Witness Offering 2021

May the Peace of Christ be with you. Each year we collect several special offerings here at Trinity.

During October, we receive the Peace and Global Witness offering which, as its name implies, goes to global and local work for peace and witness. The PCUSA still has a global mission office that supports mission co-workers (missionaries) in over 50 countries around the world.

When you give to the Peace and Global Witness offering, 50% of the gift will support global mission projects, 25% will go to the Presbytery of Northern Kansas to support mission projects like Topeka JUMP and Presbytery Wide Mission trips, like the one that Susan and Anton went on just last week to King Lake (outside Omaha). There, the 8 member Presbytery mission team worked to rehab houses that were damaged in the floods of 2019.

The remaining 25% will stay in Topeka to support Harvesters, as they continue to provide food to those people who need it during this time of food insecurity. The food that Trinity distributes the second Monday of each month is provided by Harvesters.



Church has been cancelled.



"What My Grandmothers Taught
Me" invites us into the stories of
Tamar, Rahab, Ruth, Bathsheba

The other day, a curious member of the congregation asked me, "Pastor Mere, why do we say the Affirmation of Faith every Sunday?" It's true that most Sundays, immediately following the sermon, we rise in body (and spirit) and recite one of the Creeds/Confessions of the Presbyterian Church. Very often, we recite the Apostles Creed, but we also recite others, such as the Brief Statement of Faith and the Confession of 1967. But why is an Affirmation of Faith so important? According to PCUSA curriculum, "After we hear the good news, we say what we believe. Often these words come from the

church's creeds and confessions. In these writings, we remember and tell the world who we are, what we believe, and how we should live according to God's Word."

The Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) currently has 12 Confessions compiled in our (appropriately named) Book of Confessions. The chronologically oldest Confession is the Nicene Creed (325 A.D.) and the most recent Confession is The Brief Statement of Faith. The Confession of the Belhar is the most recent addition to our Book, having been approved for inclusion in 2016, Presbyterians understand Confessions to be an authoritative witness to God's actions, mercy, and love. Ministers, Elders, and Deacons vow to be "guided by the Confessions" in their service to the Church.

Each Confession is also a historical document; every creed/confession was composed in answer to Church schism, worldly conflict, or doctrinal disagreements. For example, The Nicene Creed affirmed, for the first time, that God exists as a Trinity. The Theological Declaration of the Barmen was written by the Confessing Church in Germany as a statement against the rise of Hitler and Nazism. The Confession of 1967 was born out of the need for the church to reclaim its ministry of reconciliation. Of course, not everything in each Confession "holds up" to today's theology. For instance, some creeds contain Anti-Semitic and Anti-Roman Catholic language. But it is important for us to retain these uncomfortable portions as historical record, and a lesson that our forebears did not always "get things right."

If you are interested in learning more about the Creeds of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.), I recommend either downloading or purchasing a Book of Confessions and reading through them. And next time we confess our faith, you can give thanks for the great cloud of witnesses who came before who put pen to paper (or parchment) and gave words to what we believe.

What is Per Capita

Per Capita is a fundamental way in which all of the nearly 10,000 congregations and mid councils of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) connect, participate and share in the work of the wider church. Per capita is the primary source of funding for the Office of the General Assembly, and is how Presbyterians mutually and equitably share the costs of coming together to discern the Spirit's leading for the future.

- ♣ It is how Presbyterians are trained to become better ruling elders, teaching elders and deacons, and ministers.
- + It is how Presbyterians are helped to discern God's call in their lives.
- ♣ It is how Presbyterians participate in the life of the wider church by serving on General Assembly committees and commissions, regardless of distance or financial resources.
- → It is how Presbyterians participate in the life of the Church universal as we commit ourselves to work and live in fellowship with "all persons in every nation" (Book of Order, G-4.0101)

All Presbyterians are called to take part in the ecclesiastical and administrative work shared by the whole church though per capita giving. The annual rate is a per-member apportionment that is assessed biennially by the General Assembly. (Book of Order, G-3.0106) All congregations — large and small — are encouraged to participate, either through an annual budget item or through a special direct appeal to their congregations.







Pain Awareness

Acute Pain— generally caused by an event and associated with soft tissue damage (surgery, injury), lasting moments to several months and resolves once the cause of the pain has healed... focus is on treatment



Chronic Pain—may not be associated with an actual injury or disease... persists beyond the normal healing time of an injury or disease and has no foreseeable end point... focus on self-management

Pain is Multifactorial



Pain is More Common Than You Think:

Nearly 1 in 2 people consider themselves to be suffering from pain.

3.4 % have an extreme pain problem

1 in 5 people live with chronic pain.


