# THE FIRST READING Acts 4:1-12

THE HOLY GOSPEL

John 10:11-18

The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John. **Glory to you, Lord Christ.**






## THE BREAKING OF THE BREAD

Let us say together the prayer for spiritual communion.



This Sunday's organ prelude, composed by Everett Titcomb (30 June 1884-31 December 1968), is a setting of the hymn *The Lord's my shepherd*, set to the tune CRIMOND. This hymn, a setting of Psalm 23, will be sung after communion, as this is Good Shepherd Sunday. Many of you will remember Betty Manlich, who died in 2016. She told me after I played one of his compositions, "I knew Everett Titcomb." Betty grew

up in Boston and sang in the choir of St. John the Evangelist on Beacon Hill, just behind the State House, where Titcomb was music director and organist from 1910-1960. She recalled that Titcomb was serious and stern, that it was an accomplishment to sing with his choir which rehearsed Friday evenings from 5:30-7:30 pm. Betty recalled Titcomb playing the organ and conducting the choir from the balcony, where the organ was located. The Church of St. John the Evangelist closed in September 2013 and sold to a developer to convert the building into residences. The organ was saved and is for sale. Susan Ouellette Armstrong, in her 1987 article about Titcomb in the organist periodical, *The Tracker*, recounts that although he did not have the opportunity to receive a university education, he was meticulously prepared for his trade through fine teachers in Boston and apprenticeship, including the Church of the Advent. Years later, after Titcomb gained stature due to his successes at St. John the Evangelist, he turned down the job at the Church of the Advent, preferring to remain at the lesser St. John's where he found the atmosphere necessary for him to thrive. Though his works did not reach the fame of some of his peers, such as Leo Sowerby, Titcomb did enjoy success as a scholar of chant and composer of organ compositions and anthems. In addition to their quarters

in the St. John's property of the Cowley fathers shared with his life partner, Chester Bonney (1892-1983), who had shared his residence since 1911, the two owned a summer cottage in Epping, New Hampshire, where Titcomb composed many of his works at his Steinway piano. This included one of his most popular anthems, *Jesus, Name of Wondrous Love* (1947), dedicated to his friend, organist Roy Carlson. Carlson stopped by one afternoon to find Titcomb struggling with his oven door, which had fallen off its hinges. Carlson repaired the oven door and Titcomb dedicated the anthem to him, which seemed like an even exchange of labor as the anthem was quickly composed. He sold the rights to the publisher for \$25 which was a mistake, as the anthem would become a huge success due to two performances by the Mormon Tabernacle Choir. It was nicknamed the "oven door anthem". *By Greg Sesek*
