



THE FIRST READING

James 3:1-12

Not many of you should become teachers, my brothers and sisters, for you know that we who teach will be judged with greater strictness. For all of us make many mistakes. Anyone who makes no mistakes in speaking is perfect, able to keep the whole body in check with a bridle. If we put bits into the mouths of horses to make them obey us, we guide their whole bodies. Or look at ships: though they are so large that it takes strong winds to drive them, yet they are guided by a very small rudder wherever the will of the pilot directs. So also the tongue is a small member, yet it boasts of great exploits. How great a forest is set ablaze by a small fire! And the tongue is a fire. The tongue is placed among our members as a world of iniquity; it stains the whole body, sets on fire the cycle of nature, and is itself set on fire by hell. For every species of beast and bird, of reptile and sea creature, can be tamed and has been tamed by the human species, but no one can tame the tongue-- a restless evil, full of deadly poison. With it we bless the Lord and Father, and with it we curse those who are made in the likeness of God. From the same mouth come blessing and cursing. My brothers and sisters, this ought not to be so. Does a spring pour forth from the same opening both fresh and brackish water? Can a fig tree, my brothers and sisters, yield olives, or a grapevine figs? No more can salt water yield fresh.







Caring for Each Other and Creation:

We are living in an interesting time. At Sherwood, we are dealing with the ongoing issues of COVID-19 and wrestling with a water and erosion issue on our property. Despite these challenges, we have solutions at our fingertips. God is good!

Regarding COVID-19, the number one priority is that everyone who can be vaccinated, should be vaccinated. This is the first and best line of defense against the COVID-19 virus and variants. Bishop Sutton and Bishop Ihloff have issued a statement expecting everyone within the Diocese of Maryland to do their duty to curb infections. They stated:

Effective immediately, we are directing that the following groups be fully vaccinated against the COVID-19 coronavirus by October 18 unless they have been advised by their primary care provider not to do so: all clergy serving in any capacity in the Diocese of Maryland, members of diocesan staff, church and ministry staffs, parochial preschool and school staffs, as well as volunteers whose ministries involve continuous in-person contact with others.

We at Sherwood will be adhering to this and there will be an opportunity for everyone to whom this applies to speak with the vestry leadership and me in the upcoming weeks. So please, get vaccinated! It is the best guarantee for us to resume gathering with one another for worship and fellowship without masks and other restrictions.

As Christians, we are called to care not only for ourselves but for our neighbor, loving them as we love ourselves. It is a part of who we are, and we all are better when we work as one body, not as separate individuals. I don't know anyone who likes wearing a mask, but it is one of the best ways-outside of vaccinations-to mitigate the virus. Why wouldn't we do this for ourselves and our neighbor?

We also have an obligation to our environment as the shareholders of God's creation. Bronwyn Mitchell-Strong, Sherwood Hill Green Team Representative, has written several informative articles on our environment, especially water. The work we plan to do on our property will not only mitigate our flooding issue but clean the water as it flows into Baltimore's water system.

Protecting God's Creation Part 3

A Series About Sherwood's Water Management Initiative by Bronwyn Mitchell-Strong, Sherwood Hill Green Team Leader

Water, water everywhere, but not a drop to drink. That adage certainly nails it. The earth is a water planet. 71% of the surface is covered with water, but, as we learned last week, 97% of the water on earth is salty — that means that only 2.6% of the water on earth is fresh water, the kind we can drink. But all fresh water isn't created equal: 69% is frozen in glaciers, 30% is underground, and less than 1% is in lakes, rivers, and swamps. And it isn't all distributed equally throughout the world either. The Great Lakes of the United States account for a whopping 20% of the total fresh surface water on earth. They aren't named "Great" for nothing.

So, we have a fixed amount of water. It is always moving from one form to another, one place to another through the water cycle, used and reused. There is a lot of it, but most of it is not drinkable. Yet, every living thing needs it to live, but availability varies considerably. God certainly has a sense of humor. We are given enough—more than enough actually—to satisfy our collective needs, but it is up to us to make sure that those needs are indeed met. Therein lies the rub.

According to the World Health Organization, 1 in 3 people worldwide do not

have access to safe drinking water. Unsurprisingly, 80% of all diseases in the developing world are water related. 3 billion people lack basic handwashing facilities with soap and water at home and every year, 297 000 children under 5 years die due to diarrhea linked to inadequate washing.

More ominous still is the specter of scarcity. By 2025, the United Nations estimates that 30% of the world's population residing in 50 countries will face water shortage. Right now, we are almost 8 billion souls sharing the earth's water. By 2100, that number will rise to 11 billion. This isn't relegated to faraway lands. Just last week, the U.S. began rationing of water supplies up and down the Colorado River which services a population of 40 million people.

On average, every person in the U.S. uses about 150 gallons of water per day. In France, that number is 77 gallons, India 38 gallons, and Mali 3 gallons. Folks in Arizona and throughout the American West are being forced to cut their usage. We can voluntarily do the same to show thanks to God for the gift of water and love for our neighbors near and far.

1. Check your toilet for leaks.

Put a few drops of food coloring in your toilet tank. If, without flushing, the coloring begins to appear in the bowl, you have a leak that may be wasting more than 100 gallons of water a day.

2. Put a plastic bottle in your toilet tank or buy a new efficient toilet.

Put an inch or two of sand or pebbles in the bottom of a one-liter bottle to weigh it down. Fill the rest of the bottle with water and put it in your toilet tank, safely away from the operating mechanism. In an average home, the bottle may save five gallons or more of water every day without harming the efficiency of the toilet. If your tank is big enough, you may even be able to put in two bottles.

3. Take shorter showers.

A typical shower uses five to ten gallons of water a minute. Limit your showers to the time it takes to soap up, wash down, and rinse off.

4. Install water-saving shower heads or flow restrictors.

Your hardware or plumbing supply store stocks inexpensive shower heads or flow restrictors that will cut your shower flow to about three gallons a minute instead of five to ten. They are easy to install, and your showers will still be cleansing and refreshing.

- 5. Turn off the water while brushing your teeth and shaving.
- 6. Check faucets and pipes for leaks.

Even a small drip can waste 50 or more gallons of water a day.

- **7.** Use your automatic dishwasher and washing machine for full loads only. Every time you run your dishwasher, you use about 25 gallons of water. Your automatic washing machine uses 30 to 35 gallons per cycle.
- **8.** Don't let the faucet run while you clean vegetables. Rinse your vegetables instead in a bowl or sink full of clean water.
- 9. Plant drought-resistant trees and plants.

Many beautiful trees and plants thrive without irrigation.

10. Use a broom to clean driveways, sidewalks, and steps.

Using a hose wastes hundreds and hundreds of gallons of water.
