



THE FIRST READING

Hebrews 5:1-10





Protecting God's Creation, Part 8

A Series About Sherwood's Water Management Initiative by Bronwyn Mitchell-Strong, Sherwood Hill Green Team Leader

Last week we started to look at watershed health by looking at water quality. Now we are going to walk upstream a bit and find out the cause of the sickness. One of the number-one predictors of our own health is diet and exercise. For watersheds, it is impervious surfaces.

Impervious means not allowing entrance or passage: impenetrable. Superman is impervious to bullets, as concrete is impervious to water. In fact, all the building blocks of the human habitat are impervious surfaces. As populations have increased and modernized, so too has the percentage of land covered by impervious surfaces.

Imagine a forested landscape. Rain falls, its velocity is lowered as it comes in contact with the trees. Water drops onto the land covered in a spongy mat of

leaves. It seeps into the ground. If the rainstorm is more severe, the spongey land may get saturated, the excess water flows downhill towards a stream. And if a really, really bad storm occurs, the stream could overflow and flood. However, in a natural scenario, there is a natural flood plain, an extra layer of protection to absorb the excess.

Imagine now that the trees have been removed. The rain falls fast to the ground without any trees or leaves to break the fall. The leafy spongy floor is now grass. Some of the water still seeps into the ground, but more runs off into the nearest stream — picking up any and all pollutants. Since the area around the stream, the floodplain, has been cleared, the stream overtops more frequently and the water floods a larger area.

Now the grass is replaced with concrete. When it rains, no water is absorbed by the ground. The full volume flows into the stream—fast and furious, unbuffered. It is more than the stream can handle. Flooding events happen with even more regularity and are more severe as the waters are impacting the human communities.

To "manage" the new normal, streams are straightened and hardened to handle a greater volume of water with all of the natural habitat stripped clean. Sometimes, the streams or rivers are covered over. As it flows into the city, the Jones Falls goes from a natural feature to a concrete tube flowing underground. Out of sight, out of mind until the volume of water outgrows even the manmade adjustments-compromising pipes, and dams, and levees.

This is not what David was writing about when he said, "my cup runneth over".

The Impervious Cover Model developed in Maryland finds that streams are healthy when the percentage of impervious cover in a watershed is below 10%; they become adversely impacted between 10 and 25% and are non-supporting or completely depleted with over 25% impervious cover.

With the world's population continuing to grow, the amount of impervious surface will also grow. This means watersheds will continue to become imperiled, and with them us, too. We can't all go live in a cave, so what can we do?

As Paul wrote to the Romans, Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewal of your mind, that by testing you may discern what is the will of God, what is good and acceptable and perfect.
