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SOMETHING IS COMING...

The season of Advent means something is coming like we have never seen before. What is possible is that you might miss it, it might just brush past you. Then



you begin to grasp what it was that you missed, like Moses in the cleft of the rock, watching God's backside fade in the distance. So, stay. Sit. Ponder. Behold. Wonder. There will be time enough for running...for rushing...for worrying. Stay. Wait. Something is coming.

As we light each candle of the Advent wreath, we piece together the story of Christmas. By the time we light the last candle on Christmas Day, we know the end of the story. Or we think we do but there are many ways to tell a story, aren't there?

We can tell it as the story of an unwed mother who dared to enter into partnership with God; as a political story about the birth of a revolutionary; as a tale about a love that longed so much for us that it took flesh, formed in the body of a woman. We can tell it as a story about darkness giving birth to light, about endlessly waiting, and about what lies at the end of all our waiting.

At Advent, God's people summon the courage and the spiritual strength to remember that the holy breaks into the daily. In tiny ways, we can open our hearts to the healing grace of God, who opens the way to peace. But Advent is not a season of passive waiting and watching. It's a season of wailing and weeping, of opening up our lives with active anticipation and renewed hope, and to remember that Christ came not to dispel the darkness but to teach us to dwell with integrity, compassion, and love in the midst of that ambiguous gloom.

Darkness can be a place where our longings for healing, justice and peace grow and come alive. The gift that God holds out to us in this season is that in darkness and light, God beckons us to keep vigil and to be a companion to one another now and always.

CHOICES FOR GOOD SHEPHERD'S 2020 ALTERNATIVE CHRISTMAS MARKET

1. HIGHLANDS CAMP and RETREAT CENTER

Highlands Presbyterian Camp, near Allenspark, has provided Summer Camp experiences for children and youth for over 70 years. Their goal has always been to provide life-changing experiences to all children, regardless of their family's ability to cover the cost. CAMP IS NOT CHEAP! Although Highlands offers a 3-tier payment opportunity, many children need



additional assistance. Your gift toward Highlands Camperships could make a HUGE difference for a child in 2021 (hopefully). Giving whatever amount you choose is one suggestion of an Alternative Gift.

- 2. PRESBYTERIAN GIFTS (Presbyterian Mission Agency) https://presbyteriangifts.pcusa.org/gifts/ (Similar to Heifer International)
- \$40 covers the cost of 1 bag of Moringa Tree seeds. Moringa is an important source of nutrition, containing protein, vitamins and minerals.
- \$240 Bee-keeping supplies and instruction allows a farmer in a developing country to supplement their income from farm crops.
- \$50 covers 1 "share" of a cow, while \$450 would pay for a whole cow! Receiving a cow includes training in the care and sustainable breeding of the cow. A cow will improve food/nutrition and income security for a family.
- \$200 covers the cost of a Community Garden. Planted in the U.S., in places of food insecurity, a garden will supply nutritious fresh produce, employment and educational opportunities for the community.
- \$250 will pay for a Community Irrigation Pump to help farmers restore land that has been spoiled by drought and civil unrest. Productive land produces more and better crops.
 - \$25 will purchase a family of chickens.
 - \$178 will buy a pair of goats.

You may also contribute money to partially cover the cost of any of the above!

3. ZIMBABWE MISSION PARTNERSHIP http://zimpartnership.org

As you all know, Good Shepherd has been one the 10-12 Partner churches since soon after the creation of ZMP nearly 20 years ago. We continue to honor our commitment to the Partnership through several fund-raisers each year. Following are some ways you might consider supporting the Heather Chimhoga Care Center (HCOC) again, while also honoring a friend or loved one this Christmas.

- \$50 covers the cost of supplemental food for 1 family of orphan/vulnerable children for 1 month.
- \$100 covers the salary of a visiting doctor at the Clinic for 1 month.
- \$30 pays the required school fees for 1 child for 1 school term (3 terms per school year). And, yes, school IS happening!
 - \$150 covers the cost of AIDS medicines for 4 orphan children for 1 year.
 - \$75 will provide 40 children with 1 month of meals at the Care Center near their school.
 - Any amount donated to "wherever need most" is always greatly appreciated.

The Food Bank needs donations of pet food, toilet paper, laundry detergent, large-size diapers, macaroni and cheese, canned vegetables and holiday food items.

During November the food bank served 76 households, which included 272 individuals. One hundred of those were children 0-18 years old. Our numbers continue to climb slowly, and we have many new clients every week. With our 2 new freezers and 2 new refrigerators, we have more storage room. We have had increasing donations from Costco and Walmart, so have needed the room!


On November 18, 2020 the session of Good Shepherd Presbyterian Church voted to become a "Matthew 25 Church" as part of the initiative of the Presbyterian Church (USA) by recognizing Christ's urgent call to be a church of action where God's love, justice, and mercy shine forth and are contagious. Convicted by Matthew 25:31-46 and in response to the exhortation of the General Assembly of the PC(USA) we plan to act boldly and compassionately to serve people who are hungry, oppressed, imprisoned or poor. By doing so, we pledge to embrace these three areas of focus: building congregational vitality, dismantling structural racism, and eradicating systemic poverty.

By accepting the Matthew 25 invitation, Good Shepherd can help our denomination become a more relevant presence in the world. We rejoice how our re-energized faith can unite all Presbyterians for a common and holy purpose: our common identity to do mission. There are already PC(USA) congregations and Presbyteries (including the Denver Presbytery) that identify themselves as Matthew 25 churches/Presbyteries. We hope to help multiply this loving commitment to radical and fearless discipleship by partnering with them to help embrace these three focuses:

- Building congregational vitality by challenging people to deepen their faith and get actively and joyfully engaged with their community and the world.
- Dismantling structural racism by advocating and acting to break down the systems, practices and thinking that underlie discrimination, bias, prejudice and oppression of people of color.
- Eradicating systemic poverty by working to change laws, policies, plans and structures in our society that
 perpetuate economic exploitation of people who are poor.
