#### Scapegoating and the Cross...A Temporary Solution

The word "scapegoating" originated form an ingenious ritual described in Leviticus 16. According to Jewish law, on the Day of Atonement, the high priest laid hands on an "escaping' goat, placing all the sins of the Jewish people form the previous year onto the animal. Then the goat was beaten with reeds and thorns, driven out into the desert, and the people went home rejoicing. Violence towards the innocent victim was apparently quite effective at temporarily relieving the group's guilt and shame. The same scapegoating dynamic was at play when the European Christians burned supposed heretics at the stake, and when white American lynched Black Americans. In fact, the pattern is identical and totally non-rational.

Priest, theologian and author, Richard Rohr writes, "Whenever the sinner is excluded, our collective ego is delighted and feels relieved and safe. It works but only for a while, because it's merely an illusion. Repeatedly believing the lie, that this time we have the true culprit, we become more catatonic, habitually ignorant, and culpable - because, of course, scapegoating never really eliminates evil in the first place. As long as the evil is "over there," we can change or expel someone else as the contaminating element. We then feel purified and at peace. But it is not the peace of Christ, which "the world cannot give" (John 14:27).


Jesus became the scapegoat to reveal the universal life of scapegoating. He became the sinned-against one to reveal the hidden nature of scapegoating, so that we would see how wrong even educated and well-meaning people can be. This is represented by Pilate and Caiaphas (state & religion), who both find their artificial reasons to condemn him. In worshiping Jesus as the scapegoat, Christians should have learned to stop scapegoating, but we didn't. We are still wrong whenever we create arbitrary victims to avoid our own complicity in evil.

Authority seems to soothe anxiety for some and relieves their own responsibility to form a mature conscience. With the mistaken view of God as Punisher-in-Chief that many Christians seem to hold, we think our own violence is necessary. But there is no such thing as redemptive violence. Violence doesn't save; it only destroys all parties in both the short and long term. Jesus replaced the myth of redemptive violence with the truth of redemptive suffering. He showed us on the cross how to hold the pain and let is transform us."

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Prayer for our community: Loving God, you fill all things with a fullness & hope that we can never understand. Thank you for leading us into a time where more of reality is being unveiled for us all to see. We pray that you will take away our natural temptation for cynicism, denial, fear and despair. May we place our hope in what matters and what lasts, trusting in your eternal presence and love. Amen





And when "Permanent Pastors" are called, they continue to help the church transition into that new chapter of ministry.

#### Healthy 21st Century ministry is about the congregation more than the pastor.

Yes...we need faithful, fearless, creative, loving, well-trained pastoral leadership in every congregation. <u>But so much of what determines whether a congregation will thrive, or die is based on the congregation not the pastor.</u>

Sometimes church people do not want a new chapter of ministry. And this is sad, because stuck churches die. And here's the kicker; transitional change is not just a tweak.

In my years of ministry, I have heard church people tell me that things are changing because:

- They got a new sign
- They changed their church stationary
- They project their hymns on the wall now
- They decreased that number of elders on their governing board
- They agreed to let their pastor preach without a robe

These are tweaks...not cultural changes!

Cultural changes are way harder because our culture is so entrenched, we don't even know what it is. (And that is part of the job of the temporary Transitional Pastor: to help figure out who we are as a congregation right now.)

- Are we a congregation run by a few families?
- Are we a congregation afraid of ????
- Are we a congregation addicted to being a social club rather than an example of God's reign on earth?
- Are we a congregation who looks down on people without our income or education?
- Are we a congregation that honestly does not want "strangers" to join us?
- What else are we a congregation of???

Transitional ministry is where all of us are right now.

As our church opens its doors to in-person meetings and worship I will be inviting you all in small groups to gather for cupcakes, coffee and conversation to discuss the past, present and future happenings at Good Shepherd as we prepare the way for a new "permanent pastor."

ministries April 7-9 | Virtual Event





## Guatemala Mission Partnership Report



GMP's mission is to help the people of Guatemala with clean water.

Guatemala has many active volcanoes. Dr. Joel runs a clinic in the east central region, north of Guatemala City and Pablo is our in country liaison and lives closer to Pacaya.

In addition to Pacaya there is also one near Tiquisate (Volcan de Fuego) which was Marsha's and my first installation trip. On our side trip to Dio de la Muerta we saw it smoking and later it erupted killing 165 people. - Fred Finke

#### ASH DISPERSION AND ACTIVITY UPDATE

March 24th, 2021. In the last hours, the Pacaya volcano has presented the formation of gas and ash columns from 3000 to 4500 meters above sea level (9842 to 13123 feet), which have dispersed in different directions. Meteorological models indicate that this ash can move to the northeast and east at superficial to medium levels, and in a southwest direction at high levels (greater than 5000 meters above sea level). The processing of satellite images that record the dispersion of ash, so far indicate a direction of displacement towards the northeast. OVPAC observers report south wind around the volcanic edifice. Volcanic activity has been accompanied by sounds similar to a train locomotive faintly and explosions sporadically. The effusive-type activity has allowed the lava flow to the southwest to continue active, with reported lengths of up to 1,400 meters.

## Annual Elephant Rock Ride

We now have 8 people in the process of registering to ride for TEAM GOOD SHEPHERD on June 6<sup>th</sup> at the Douglas County Fair Grounds! They are Stephen Chappell, Pastor Sheri and her family (5 people), Teddie McConnell and David Wolters. They will be raising much-needed support for the Heather Chimhoga Care Center in Zimbabwe.



Our partners in Zimbabwe tell us that the community vegetable gardens have had a very successful year due to abundant rainfall. The poultry project is now self-supporting and providing protein for the children's meals. The moringa project is also a growing source of nutrition, as well as a new product to market. Part of the Clinic is in use, although it is not completely finished nor had an "official grand opening." That should take place sometime in the next several months.

COVID-19 remains an extreme challenge in Zimbabwe, and schools are currently closed. Staff members, families and community caregivers provide food delivery, medical care and educational to help to the children as much as possible. Our continued financial support is critical through fund-raisers and congregational pledges from the churches in the ZMP. Thank you in advance for your on-going support of and dedication to this important mission.



The ONE GREAT HOUR OF SHARING offering is currently being received. This is the annual Lenten-season offering that supports the Presbyterian Mission Agency in its response to on-going and urgent needs related to hunger and disaster assistance around the world.

#### OTHER MISSION-RELATED OUTREACH

The Mission Committee is looking forward to re-establishing a relationship with Vantage Point High School and is also involved in the process for Good Shepherd becoming a registered Safe Parking location for a limited number of homeless families living in their vehicles. Stay tuned for new developments!

The Good Shepherd Food Bank served 63 households, 204 individuals and 64 children during March. They are in desperate need of diapers in sizes 2, 4, and 5.

## Our Daily Bread Report

We met today via Zoom. Churches involved are Covenant DTC, Good Shepherd, St. Paul, and Westminster Pres. Each member brought us up-to-date on what was going on. Everyone except us is doing drive through disbursement. Covenant Cupboard has hundreds of families come every Friday. Westminster has 25-30 families per week. St. Paul gives out 30-40 boxes per week. I think these food banks are open once or twice a week. None of the other food banks uses Link2Feed, as we do. Some get food from Food Bank of the Rockies. A couple (including us) do TEFAP distributions.

Future plans are still up in the air as to continue the drive through or allow people in the food banks. Most will continue drive throughs through the summer and reevaluate in the fall.

We will meet again in a few months. Have not heard about any funds from Presbytery, as their mission giving has been down quite a bit this year.

### Highlands Camp Report



Highlands is going to pursue one team for Partnership Day Camp this summer, and has 5 churches currently very interested. Lots of logistics to consider. There are many dates for Family Camps scheduled, some 3 days and some 4 days. Maria has asked several regulars to be volunteer leaders for some of these camps. We will hire some staff for this summer and so far have hired Hunter Fritz to work at Highlands as activities coordinator. He will also help out where

needed, and will be a valuable resource. The Mountain Bike Park is being planned by a professional mountain bike company for a reasonable fee, and then volunteers will help build it. The big need is dirt, and that can be very expensive.
