



Greening

I remember many springtime's when I'd awaken in the morning, look out the window and wow...there this green grass would be. Robust, vibrant grass. It seemed like it was an overnight kind of thing, brown one day and bright green the next. This greening always came in the springtime when we had snow and rain.

When I look closely as I walk my dog Maisey, I can perceive little things all-around of new life...almost like the earth is straining, trying to draw forth new life from within it. I know the green will come again and that it will just be a matter of time before warmth and moisture provide the right conditions for change and growth.

This process of the earth's greening after a long winter reminds me of our spiritual "eastering," the inner transformation and rebirthing that comes after we've had a long winter spell of the spirit. The dead, brown grass is there for a long time in our hearts, or so it seems. No amount of hurry, or push, or desire can make the green happen any sooner.

I think of people I know who are longing for an inner greening and are yet in the throes of a spiritual winter: folks who have lost their loved ones; a child struggling with a new career and fears her ability to cope with the challenges it requires; a friend who fell into deep, clinical depression and struggles to live through each day with little energy. Each one needs an "eastering," a bright greening, and how they long for it to come soon.

But it may be a slow process, a tiny bit of life gradually weaving through the pain and questions. Eastering isn't always a quick step out of the tomb. Sometimes rising from the dead takes a long, slowly greening time. It can't be hurried.

It's my hope for you this Easter season that you will trust the resurrection of your spirit, believe that joy and new life will come for you, even though it may not be there for you now. If you are one of the fortunate ones whose soul sings with happy alleluias this Easter, may you turn often to those who are still awaiting their greening and walk hopefully with them.



EARTH DAY...HOW TO LIVE MORE SUSTAINABLY IN COLORADO

The planet desperately needs us to go beyond recycling soda cans and washing laundry in cold water. In honor of Earth Day, 5280 magazine checked in with Colorado's eco-experts about their efforts to save the planet and what we can do to make a bigger impact each day.

- Run your dishwasher only when it's full.
- Turn off the lights when you leave the room.
- Recycle glass and plastic containers, aluminum cans, cardboard, newspapers, and paper products.
- Turn off the water while you're brushing your teeth.
- Reduce your consumption of beef (even a little bit). Beef production uses more land than other protein sources, and the cows create methane gas.
- Always carry reusable totes to avoid single-use plastic bags.
- Walk, bike, or use public transit for trips one mile or less – transportation is the 2nd largest emitter of greenhouse gases in Colorado.
- Use cold water to wash your laundry and line dry your clothes when possible.
- Replace inefficient incandescent lightbulbs with efficient LEDs.
- Install an energy-saving thermostat.
- Shorten your shower from typical 8 minutes to 5 minutes to save 6 gallons of heated water.
- Stop buying bottled water, use a refillable bottle instead.
- Unplug electronics when they're not in use.



Sermon Musings

John 10:11-18

Jesus describes himself as a shepherd. For people in the United States today, the idea of a sheep or shepherd is far beyond our reality. In most children's Christian literature illustrations, Jesus is depicted as a smiling, tall, thin White man with a staff, surrounded by sheep. The sheep, somehow aware of who he is, smile in his presence. They, too, are joyful. But this is a cartoon interpretation. Shepherds smell like sheep. And sheep smell like "outside." Like grass, like dirt, like whatever they were chewing on. Even more, sheep will fight for dominance. They will throw themselves at each other. This goes on for hours, often until one ram gives up and walks off. And Jesus is there for all of it. To serve as a shepherd, one must be wise. One must also be willing to take on the burden of the ones they serve.




This text also shows love is embodied as presence, as healing, as protection and care.

This faith we choose is not merely a set of abstract claims. It is a way of living in community - a commitment to the practice of kingdom values with and for each other.  not be passing the plates during the service.
- Unfortunately, the choir will not be singing at this time. During the worship service, our music minister Sara
 Tyburczy and occasional soloists will sing from the front of the church. We ask the congregation to participate
 by listening and meditating on the words of the hymn.
- We are hosting other small group church activities in the church i.e., the Women's Circle, The Men's Shed, the Session meetings, educational book studies and of course the Food Bank.

On Sunday, May 9 – Mother's Day - the church will host a Mother's Day to Father's Day diaper drive.

Let's work together to collect diapers for families in need that will be distributed through the *Good Shepherd Food Bank*. Nationally, 1 in 3 families with children under age 3 struggle to buy diapers.

The Good Shepherd Food Bank connects with many families every month and often do not have enough diapers to help families.

Our Food Bank volunteers observe that diapers help more than just the babies who wear them.

"There are also consequences for parents and caregivers. Consequences like increased stress and depression, consequences like missing work or school because parents aren't able to bring children to daycare when they run out of diapers, and so for us we see providing diapers to the most vulnerable members of our community as something that not just impacts the health and well-being of infants but can have a positive impact on families as a whole."

ZIMBABWE MISSION PARTNERSHIP

We now have 8 people in the process of registering to ride for TEAM GOOD SHEPHERD on June 6th at the Douglas County Fair Grounds! They are Stephen Chappell, Pastor Sheri and her family (5 people), Teddie McConnell and David Wolters. They will be raising much-needed support for the Heather Chimhoga Care Center in Zimbabwe.



Our partners in Zimbabwe tell us that the community vegetable gardens have had a very successful year due to abundant rainfall. The poultry project is now self-supporting and providing protein for the children's meals. The moringa project is also a growing source of nutrition, as well as a new product to market. Part of the Clinic is in use, although it is not completely finished nor had an "official grand opening." That should take place sometime in the next several months.

COVID-19 remains an extreme challenge in Zimbabwe, and schools are currently closed. Staff members, families and community caregivers provide food delivery, medical care and educational to help to the children as much as possible. Our continued financial support is critical through fund-raisers and congregational pledges from the churches in the ZMP.
