Dear Sisters in Christ,









National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI)

As I write this in September it is National Suicide Prevention Awareness month in time of the COVID pandemic, and I think of those suffering from mental health conditions. From the past 18 months of imposed quarantines, loneliness of being homebound and isolated, social distancing in public spaces, business closings, job losses, economic recession to deciding whether to vaccinate or not, mask up or not, and even experiencing loss of friends and family members due to Covid-19, all of our lives have been upended and we face specific challenges during the pandemic which can be stressful or overwhelming. With uncertainties in everyday life, the pandemic negatively affects the mental well-being of so many people. Vulnerable populations such as seniors living alone and those with mental health and substance abuse disorders are particularly affected. Statistically, about 4 in 10 adults in the US have reported increases in symptoms of anxiety or depressive disorder during the pandemic up from 1 in 10 adults in 2019 [1]. For Americans age 10 to 34 suicide is the second leading cause of death, which is staggering as we consider that for every suicide there is an estimated 100 to 200 others in suicide attempts, ideations, and behaviors [2]. This is amplified by season of change during the pandemic as teens and young adults experience significant stresses when they gain more responsibilities and independence in life transitions.

The National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI) is a non-profit agency that conducts educational programs, meetings, and support groups throughout the entire county addressing every aspect of mental health from teens to older adults and seniors. The NAMI Orange County chapter ensures that individuals and their families are not alone on their mental health journey but have direct access and support to mental health care. Come Saturday November 20th, NAMI Orange County will be holding a community 5K Walks fundraiser at Angels Stadium in Anaheim (www.namioc.org/namiwalks-2021-1). It is a family friendly event that continues to welcome walkers at this time to help in their fundraising efforts. A personal matter to me, I have signed up to be a participating walker to raise awareness and to contribute to NAMI OC's mission. Donors can help me in my fundraising goal at www.namiwalks.org/participant/367676. We need to support each other as we emerge out of the economic slowdowns and your gifts to NAMI OC to the collective well-being of the community make real differences in people's lives.

Holidays



Sunday, October 31

Halloween is a holiday celebrated each year on October 31. The tradition originated with the ancient Celtic festival of Samhain (pronounced sow-in) when people would light bonfires and wear costumes to ward off ghosts. The Celts, who lived 2,000 years ago, mostly in the area that is now Ireland, the

United Kingdom and northern France, celebrated their new year on November 1. In the eighth century, Pope Gregory III designated November 1 as a time to honor all saints. Soon, All Saints Day incorporated some of the traditions of Samhain. The evening before was known as All Hallows Eve, and later Halloween. Over time, Halloween evolved into a day of activities like trick-or-treating, carving jack-o-lanterns, festive gatherings, donning costumes and eating treats.





Thanksgiving, Thursday, November 25

Why does Thanksgiving fall on the fourth Thursday of November?

Every year, Thanksgiving falls on the fourth Thursday of November. However, Thanksgiving used

to be celebrated on the last Thursday of the month. In 1863, during the Civil War, President Abraham Lincoln gave the Thanksgiving proclamation and asked for Americans to set aside the last Thursday of November as a day of Thanksgiving. After that, it became the norm to hold the holiday on that day.

However, in the 1930s, there were two years when Thanksgiving fell on the fifth Thursday of November, reports NPR. Business owners complained to President Franklin D. Roosevelt that this would hurt retailers because there was less time to shop for Christmas. To remedy this, Congress passed a law in 1941 that officially made Thanksgiving the fourth Thursday of every November.



Veterans Day Thursday, November 11



What many Americans may not realize is that Veterans Day was originally celebrated as Armistice Day. World War I, known across the world as "The Great War", officially ended with the Treaty of Versailles, which was signed on June 28, 1919. The fighting, however, had ended seven months prior with a ceasefire, or armistice, which went into effect at 11 o'clock on November 11, 1918. It was the eleventh hour of the eleventh day in the eleventh month. In Europe, November 11 is still known as Armistice Day or Remembrance Day in Canada.

At 11 o'clock, there is a moment of silence to remember those who have fallen in service to their country. To commemorate Armistice Day, people wear a red poppy.

The Red Poppy

The Red Poppy is a symbol of both remembrance and hope for a peaceful future.

It was chosen as a symbol due to the fact that, during the horrendous fighting in the European trenches, the land was blasted and bombed into a muddy, barren, bleak landscape where little to nothing could grow. The bright red Flanders



poppies were the notable exception and flourished in the fields where so much destruction had occurred, creating a striking juxtaposition of fragile beauty against the destroyed scenery.

In the Spring of 1915, a Canadian doctor, Lieutenant Colonel John McCrae, shortly after losing a friend to the fighting, was moved by the sight of the poppies and composed a now famous poem, 'In Flanders Fields.'

In Flanders fields the poppies blow Between the crosses, row on row,

That mark our place; and in the sky

The larks, still bravely singing, fly Scarce heard amid the guns below.

We are the Dead. Short days agoTake up our quarrel with the foe:We lived, felt dawn, saw sunset glow,
Loved and were loved, and now we
lie,To you from failing hands we throw
The torch; be yours to hold it high.
If ye break faith with us who dieIn Flanders fields.We shall not sleep, though poppies grow
In Flanders fields.




The war created prime conditions for poppies to flourish in Flanders and north-west France (and Gallipoli). Continual bombardment disturbed the soil and brought the seeds to the surface. They were fertilized by nitrogen in the explosives and lime from the shattered rubble of the buildings.

The species of poppy that grew on Flanders fields was the Papaver rhoeas, a Mediterranean wildflower found across southern Europe.

- Veterans Day does not have an apostrophe (it is not Veteran's Day or Veterans' Day) because the holiday does not belong to one or multiple veterans which the apostrophe would imply. It is a day for honoring ALL veterans.
- Veterans Day is not the same as Memorial Day. Memorial Day is a day to remember specifically those, "who gave the last full measure of devotion" to quote Abraham Lincoln. Veterans Day is a day to remember all who served, in war or at peace, dead or alive.

I encourage all of you to watch this 25-minute-long video. 


