Six days you shall labor and do all your work. But the seventh day is a sabbath to the Lord your God; you shall not do any work—you, your son or your daughter, your male or female slave, your livestock, or the alien resident in your towns.

-Exodus 20:9-10

The apostles gathered around Jesus, and told him all that they had done and taught. He said to them, "Come away to a deserted place all by yourselves and rest a while." For many were coming and going, and they had no leisure even to eat. And they went away in the boat to a deserted place by themselves.

-Mark 6:30-32

I cannot tell you how much I appreciate the careful deliberation of clergy and lay leaders in this challenging situation. I trust you and your leadership as you make faithful decisions to serve your community and keep your people safe, especially the most vulnerable.

By now, disaster fatigue is setting in. We are all learning new routines and skills as we pivot during this crisis. Our normal rhythms of work and rest have been disrupted. It is vitally important to intentionally plan your time off. Daily prayer and weekly sabbath are not a commandment to satisfy a demanding God, but a lifeline, a gift of respite for us. Take walks, read books, play with your children, go away in a boat to a deserted place. So order and discipline your lives to work eight hour days, and to find one 24-hour period each week when you light the Sabbath candles and rest from your labor. What day will that be for you this week? How will you communicate this to your people? Your mental and spiritual health depend on it. Your people need you rested, joyful and creative.

Congregations are busy planning what must be done to hold in-person worship, and watching the cases and fatalities in their area to prayerfully determine the "hows" and the "whens".
