

Close to Home: Seeking Sanctuary

December 19, 2021

Welcome! Whatever your background and however you have come to be here, we are glad you are. It is our prayer that you will encounter God's peace this morning. If you're new to our community, or if you have questions or other needs, please ask. There's no such thing as a stupid question. We've all been "new" at some point.

About Our Worship: As Christians in the Episcopal (episcopal=church with bishops) tradition, our worship is rooted in Holy Scripture and the Book of Common Prayer (BCP), which—for centuries—has united Christians all over the world in a common language of prayer and worship. The hope of finding ourselves in the midst of this ancient tradition is that we might both learn from those who have come before and add our own voices to the heavenly chorus. Our liturgy (the work of the people in worship) helps us when our words fail, ensures that we hear a thorough account of God's Word, and invites us to add our own voices and experience to God's story. You will find some people kneeling, bowing, and making the sign of the cross as expressions of devotion and blessing. This is neither requisite nor uniform, and we invite you to participate as you feel comfortable.

Worshipping with Children: We are delighted to have children in our midst no matter how squiggly they may be. Worship bulletins for children are located on the table in the rear lobby. Activity bags and a small library of books can be found right outside of the left door next to the piano. In order to reduce cross-contamination, each household has a designated bag. If you are new, we invite you to pick up a bag with a "New Friend" tag.

Restrooms: Restrooms are located at the end of the hallway behind the stairs. Exit through the front or rear doors and make a right at the double doors.

As an act of care for yourself and all those gathered, please maintain appropriate physical distance at all times.

Masks: Masks must be worn over mouth and nose by all those above the age of two.

ADVENT

Welcome to Advent (from the Latin word *adventus*, which means "to come." Advent—the four weeks leading up to Christmas—is a time of preparation and expectation for the coming celebration of Jesus' birth and the final coming of Christ in power and glory. The liturgical color for Advent is deep blue, which symbolizes hope, expectant waiting, and the faithfulness of Mary, Jesus' mother. One of the best-known customs for the season is the Advent wreath. The unbroken circle of greens is clearly an image of everlasting life, a victory wreath, the crown of Christ, or the wheel of time itself. The wreath is also a sign that Christ reaches into our time to lead us to the light of abundant life.





PRAYER OF THE DAY

Celebrant The Lord be with you.

Celebrant Holy God, we come to your Scripture today hoping that it will feel a bit like an open door, like Elizabeth welcoming Mary, like coming home. We want to fall into it. We want to find sanctuary here. We want to breathe easier just hearing these words. And we want to find ourselves laughing because this good news is just too good to keep inside. So hover close to us now, we pray. Open the door to our hearts so that we might find sanctuary in your words. Gratefully we pray. Amen.

THE OLD TESTAMENT

Micah 5:2-5a

Micah prophesied at about the same time as Isaiah, at the end of the eighth century BCE. He focuses particularly upon the social injustices of a period turbulent with political upheaval. Today's reading springs from the hope of a restoration of the Davidic monarchy after the exile. From Bethlehem, David's city, will come a new ruler, a shepherd-king.

But you, O Bethlehem of Ephrathah, who are one of the little clans of Judah, from you shall come forth for me one who is to rule in Israel, whose origin is from of old, from ancient days.

Therefore he shall give them up until the time when she who is in labor has brought forth; then the rest of his kindred shall return to the people of Israel.

And he shall stand and feed his flock in the strength of the LORD, in the majesty of the name of the LORD his God. And they shall live secure, for now he shall be great

to the ends of the earth; and he shall be the one of peace. If the Assyrians come into our land and tread upon our soil, we will raise against them seven shepherds and eight installed as rulers. Reader The Word of the Lord.

THE PSALM Psalm 80:1-7

This lament of the nation for deliverance probably comes from the northern kingdom, whose tribe are enumerated.

- ¹ Hear, O Shepherd of Israel, leading Joseph like a flock; * shine forth, you that are enthroned upon the cherubim.
- ² In the presence of Ephraim, Benjamin, and Manasseh, * stir up your strength and come to help us.
- ³Restore us, O God of hosts; * show the light of your countenance, and we shall be saved.
- ⁴O God of hosts, *

how long will you be angered despite the prayers of your people?

- ⁵You have fed them with the bread of tears; * you have given them bowls of tears to drink.
- ⁶You have made us the derision of our neighbors. * and our enemies laugh us to scorn.
- ⁷Restore us. O God of hosts: * show the light of your countenance, and we shall be saved.

+THE GOSPEL LESSON (8 a.m. only)

Luke's account of the visitation of Mary to her kinswoman Elizabeth connects the parallel stories of Jesus and John. Luke shows John, in the womb, beginning his ministry of witness to Jesus. Characteristic also of Luke is the emphasis upon women and their response to the Lord, and the emphasis upon the work of the Holy Spirit.

Luke 1:39-55

Deacon The Holy Gospel of our Savior Jesus Christ according to Luke.

People Glory to you, Lord Christ.

In those days Mary set out and went with haste to a Judean town in the hill country, where she entered the house of Zechariah and greeted Elizabeth. When Elizabeth heard Mary's greeting, the child leaped in her womb. And Elizabeth was filled with the Holy Spirit and exclaimed with a loud cry, "Blessed are you among women, and blessed is the fruit of your womb. And why has this happened to me, that the mother of my Lord comes to me? For as soon as I heard the sound of your greeting, the child in my womb leaped for joy. And blessed is she who believed that there would be a fulfillment of what was spoken to her by the Lord."

And Mary said,

"My soul magnifies the Lord, and my spirit rejoices in God my Savior,

for he has looked with favor on the lowliness of his servant.

Surely, from now on all generations will call me blessed;

for the Mighty One has done great things for me, and holy is his name.

His mercy is for those who fear him from generation to generation.

He has shown strength with his arm;

he has scattered the proud in the thoughts of their hearts.

He has brought down the powerful from their thrones, and lifted up the lowly;

he has filled the hungry with good things,

and sent the rich away empty.

He has helped his servant Israel, in remembrance of his mercy,

according to the promise he made to our ancestors,

to Abraham and to his descendants forever."

WE RESPOND TO GOD

+AFFIRMATION OF FAITH: THE NICENE CREED

The Nicene Creed, the Church's central statement of faith, emerged out of the first four councils of the Church in the 4th century in response to controversies about Jesus' divinity. The Latin root of the phrase "we believe" (credo) means to "give one's heart." The creed is our way of affirming to the foundation to which we orient our hearts and lives. The term "apostolic" refers to the historic succession of the apostles (original leaders of the early church) through our bishops. The term "catholic" refers to the universal church throughout the world.

Celebrant

Let us affirm our faith in the One, holy, and living God:

All

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father. Through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven: by the power of the Holy Spirit he became incarnate from the Virgin Mary, and was made man. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate: he suffered death and was buried.

On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son. With the Father and the Son he is worshiped and glorified. He has spoken through the Prophets.

We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

Hear the prayers of your people, O God of hosts. May those who have fed on the bread of tears, feed instead on your strength, O Lord. Show them the light of your countenance and be their salvation. 
The Celebrant continues.

But we became too nearsighted to see the grace awaiting us in your infinite heart. Hamstrung by arrogance, we walked the burning sands of sin, limping down that dusty road to death's prison.

You sent Isaiah and Miriam, Hannah and Amos, to call us home, but our ears were stuffed with the world's empty promises. Then, you asked Jesus to walk the holy way, leaving glory to be born in a stable.

Holy are you, Hopeful Heart, and all creation calls your child, our Savior, Jesus Christ, blessed. And so, as we prepare to celebrate his birth—as we journey once again the holy ways, seeking to hear and proclaim his life, death and resurrection—we whisper of that mystery we call faith:

Give us this day our daily bread.


And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us.

This is the table, not of the church, but of the Lord. It is made ready for those who love God and for those who want to love God more. So come, you who have much faith and you who have little; you who have been here often and you who have not been here long; you who have tried to follow and you who have failed. Come, because it is Christ who bids you come. It is Christ who meets you here. You need not be an Episcopalian to feast here. In lieu of receiving communion, you may cross your arms on your chest, and the priest will give you a blessing.
