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Associate General Presbyter—Nancy Meehan Yao

I don't know if you have ever thought of "stubbornness" as a virtue. I know when my children were stubborn, it sure didn't feel virtuous. Perhaps naming it "persistence" sounds better.

We have been living in this "covid" time for 6 months now—and people who work in trauma events say that at 6 months, people typically feel as if they have hit a wall. We have been doing this for so long, and we just want to have a "normal" life, whatever that might look like…and yet we are beginning to see that whatever normal will look like in the future, it will be the old normal—not in church, not in school, not in our communities.



When we think of the lives of the people of faith, of the people in the Bible, we can see that they were persistent, enduring many things along the way, even as their "normal" changed...

- Abraham, in following God's call—even when it looked like it was not coming true, when he and Sarai had no children.
- Joseph, in continuing to do good for a people who were not his own, whether in jail, or at the court of Pharaoh. Deborah, who judged for her people at a difficult time.
- Mary, who told the good news of Jesus' resurrection even when the other disciples did not believe her.
- Paul, and others, who persisted in sharing the Gospel that they had received-even in the face of harassment.

In a survey about church in this time, done by the Lake Institute of Faith and Giving, responders said:

- "We will have to experiment often, pray fervently, invite others in, and not be afraid to fail."
- "We will weather this crisis and see new opportunities."
- "We will possibly have to let go some things that we were doing before."

In my work with congregations, I have seen you be stubborn- even persistent, in continuing to be the church in this new landscape we find ourselves. Sometimes persistence looks like taking a rest, for awhile. Sometimes persistence is keepin' on keepin' on. Sometimes persistence looks like trying new things, even when that might make us uncomfortable or anxious... but we persist, because it will get us to our goal. Oh, this has taken adjustments, and we are finding ways to be the church that do not necessarily look like our old ways—but we are still the church.

Exodus 13: 8 says "God will direct you, and you will be able to endure." Let us endure, running the race that has been set before us.

Mandatory Boundary Training for Pastoral Leaders

The Presbytery of Shenandoah requires pastoral leaders (Teaching Elders and Commissioned Ruling Elders) to take part in mandatory Boundary Training every 3 years.

Boundary training focuses on developing healthy boundaries in ministry, and is specific to the role of pastoral leaders. We will cover power differences between pastoral leaders and church staff/members of the congregation/persons being counseled by the pastor. We will also have discussion about personal and professional health, and the use of and creating policies regarding social media in your church.

If you are new to the Presbytery, or did NOT do Boundary Training with us in 2018/2019, you MUST do this training. Training will be via zoom.

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Preaching Workshop for Elders

For three Monday nights, I had the privilege of leading a workshop for ruling elders on preaching. The participants came from a variety of churches throughout Shenandoah Presbytery. Some had preached before, but others had not. Yet, all of them were eager to learn more about preaching.

The workshop's subtitle, "You Want ME to Preach?!?!" sought to suggest that any ruling elder might get the call, asking him or her to fill the pulpit on a Sunday. We



went through what preaching is, which text to choose, what preparations to make, what goes into writing a sermon, and what to expect when you preach. We looked at putting worship together when you preach.

I want to thank those who joined me in Zoom. Also, our Associate General Presbyter, Nancy Meehan Yao and our Director of Communications, Donna Lanaghan for both their technical assistance and their support.

Stewardship in a Time of Pandemic

Congregations are facing many challenges these days: when to resume in-person worship, if that is possible, how to do that safely, how to remain a community while we are distancing, how to be the church in new ways.

Among these challenges is the issue of Stewardship. Fall is, for many of us, Stewardship season. Whatever planning we might have done earlier in the year has been upended, and any stewardship efforts will need to be celebrated and embraced in new ways.

For some of us, this has been a move to on-line or electronic giving. For others, it has meant dropping an offering envelope in a bucket as we experience drive-in worship. The Lake Institute of Faith and Giving, in a national poll, has said that giving to churches has declined in this time, while "virtual" attendance has increased. But many of you in this Presbytery have reported continued faithful giving from members, even in this time of physical distancing, and for that we give thanks.

But stewardship is not merely about money—it is about the values we hold, and the ways we live out those values. William G. Enright, in Kitchen Table Giving, wrote:

"Guardians are anchored to the past and stuck in the status quo; they act to preserve and protect old interests and bygone alliances. Stewards, by contrast, see themselves to be servants of an institutional vision and calling. They focus on tomorrow as they harness their institutional resources in such a way as to embrace the new opportunities on their organizations' doorsteps."

Our call, I believe, is to be stewards of what God has entrusted to us—so that we can embrace new opportunities, new ways of being the church in this new landscape and time. And that means we will have to let go of some things, in order to be stewards not only of our past, but also of the future God is already creating.

Committee on Presbytery Administration (CPA)

The CPA has the responsibility of proposing an annual Presbytery budget, as well as oversight of the Presbytery staff and property. At first glance this might not seem to be the most exciting of committees, but working with our talented staff, seeing all the wonderful ways the Presbytery budget funds ministry and mission, both locally and globally, and being good stewards of property, has been for me very rewarding!

This pandemic year of 2020 has raised unique challenges to our budget process, the way our Presbytery staff works, and to our property needs.

Our Presbytery staff has adapted well to working from home, conducting their work by Zoom meetings, email, and phone. The staff continue to perform at a very productive level. Our Presbytery staff is one of the Shenandoah Presbytery's major strengths.

The Presbytery property, IIII N. Main St., Harrisonburg, Va., has been listed for sale for several years. This time of pandemic has confirmed for us that we have much more office space and property than we need. As an act of stewardship, we have intensified our efforts to sell the property and move into a more economical space.

As we prepare a 2021 budget for Presbytery approval, we work with a projected 2020 shortfall of \$68,269.44. We do have reserve funds that we can use to make up the difference.

We ask congregations, as you receive your 2021 Asking Letter this Fall, to commit to the full amount requested. When all congregations give their level of support, the Presbytery budget is fully-funded!

One way we will help congregations in 2021 is to lower the Per Capita rate. The Per Capita money goes to fund, in part, the ministry and mission of our Governing Bodies: the Shenandoah Presbytery, the Synod of the Mid-Atlantic, and the General Assembly. In 2020, the Per Capita rate was \$49.49. We propose a 2021 rate of \$48.39.

The CPA looks forward to presenting the 2021 budget at the November Presbytery meeting. When available, please study this proposed budget and be aware of the many ways our Presbytery proclaims the Gospel.

The Moffett Grant Fund Committee receives applications annually from churches and mission communities for funding grants to "empower congregations to be centers for mission through the task of diakonia: sending servant leaders to minister to the pain of a hurting world."

- Applications receive consideration based on the following priorities:
- Small churches, ministries which use lay leadership, ministries which enhance the mission and the understanding of
 mission in the local congregation, Mission Communities, and other congregations within the presbytery.
- Average amount of awarded grants range from \$500 \$2,000 each year.
- The deadline for submitting applications to the Presbytery Office is no later than 4:00pm -- Thursday, October 8, 2020


