Worship in a pandemic world: no singing, no problem

Give your worship a boost by discovering other ways to engage the senses and lift your spirits

If you are gathering for a masked and socially distant in-person worship during the Advent season, it's obviously going to be very different. Advent without singing? Without our responsive liturgies? Will it even feel like Advent?

Even though we are called the "frozen chosen" for good reason, this season is an excellent time to introduce some movement into worship. Consider adopting a different prayer posture for each Sunday of Advent. Worship leaders can choose postures that best suit their particular congregation and context, but here are some suggestions:

Hope Hands stretched up above the head

and eyes to the sky in hopeful anticipation.

Peace Arms reaching out in front with palms upstretched, ready to receive God's peace.

Love Arms crossed over one's chest.

Joy Jazz hands! Or maybe just a single fist jabbed up at the sky, à la "The Breakfast Club."

Smells and bells

While I'm not a fan of incense (because of allergies), now is a really good time to take a note from our high church Anglican friends and trot out some smells and bells. Consider using a chime from your organ or a single handbell to replace a traditionally sung response. Relate the number of chimes to something specific to your theme or your congregation. Do a survey of your congregation to discover their top five holiday smells, and then have those scents welcome people as they come in the door. Baking bread, mulled cider, peppermint and even a freshly cut fir tree are smells that are easy to replicate and shouldn't bother even super-sensitive noses. Consider different ways sounds and smells might be incorporated in places and spaces that used to be occupied by singing and/or speaking.

The Collierstown PW is busy helping "The Pike", a pandemic learning pod, begin operation as an outreach ministry of Collierstown Presbyterian Church on December 2. The learning pod is designed to provide a safe learning environment that is easily accessible and affordable for the community's children in grades K-6. The Pike will be staffed by a teacher and an assistant and will meet from 8:30 a.m. -2:30 p.m. on Wednesday through Friday. It has the goal of assisting and supporting students who are now learning virtually in a caring Christian environment. CPC PW is providing supplies and equipment for The Pike and hopes to serve as a resource offering volunteers and other programing for the pod's operation and witness .

Collierstown PW is reaching out with cards and holiday greetings to residents in assisted living and nursing homes in Rockbridge County and Lexington. The project's goal is for all residents to receive Christmas greetings during the holidays when families are unable to gather with their loved ones.

The Rockbridge Area Community Services Board contacted the Collierstown PW in early November in need of donors willing to be a "Santa to A Senior" for approximately 40 clients. These individuals have needs for clothing, personal hygiene items, small appliances, and other items that will improve the quality of life and the ability to live independently. The Presbyterian Women have secured sponsors or donors for all and look forward to making this special time of the year more comfortable for each recipient.

As Christmas draws nearer PW members are making extra cookies and holiday goodies that will be packaged and taken by the church's children and youth as they Christmas Carol in the community. Projects that were once done in the church's kitchen with many gathered in one location are still being done but in a different way. We are thinking and working differently but our outreach and the message of the good news is still being proclaimed! "Be not afraid; for behold,

The past, present, and future are female — Christian education at home

Last Saturday I shed a healthy dose of tears. In part, they were tears of relief that the agonizing election cycle was finally coming to an end. More than that, though, they were tears of joy — from seeing a woman of color elected as vice president. Not to mention, a record number of women were elected to the U.S. House of Representatives. And it only took a little more than two centuries for it to happen!

God has always called people who identify as women to leadership. We know this, but we don't always name it and celebrate it. Recent elections along with one of the Revised Common Lectionary readings for this week give us an opportunity to focus on the female leaders who serve as the hands and feet of Christ.

Begin the time with your children by asking them to list people they think are good leaders. Then ask them to explain what makes these people good leaders. If your children are younger, you may want to offer an example of a good leader in their lives (for example: a teacher, a caregiver, a coach, a pastor) and ask them what they like best about that person. Call attention to the women your children list. If they did not include any women in their list, encourage them to add some and explore what leadership traits these people exhibit. Note that God does not call people of only one gender to lead. Because all peo-

ple are God's children, God calls people of every gender to be leaders



Deborah summoned Barak the leader of the Israelite and said. 'The Lord, the God of Israel, has commanded, "Go and march to Mount Tabor with ten thousand men from the tribes of Naphtali and Zebulun. I will draw out Sisera, the commander of Jabin's army, with his chariots and his many troops to the river Kishon, and I will give you victory over him."'

Prepare to share the Scripture reading with your children. While the lectionary reading for this Sunday includes only verses 1-7 of Judges 4, you'll likely want to read the entire chapter to your children so that they can hear the entire arc of Deborah's story. In fact, a children's Bible that includes a retelling of Judges 4 is best for young children because it simplifies the complexities of the time period. "Family Story Bible" by Ralph Milton and "Growing in God's Love: A Story Bible" by Elizabeth Caldwell and Carol Wehrheim include excellent child-friendly versions of the text.

Before you begin reading, explain that the reading comes from the Old Testament book of Judges. This part of the Bible tells us about the history of the Israelites once they are living in the Promised Land. Point out that these judges are a bit different than the judges we have in courtrooms today. Biblical judges were people who handled legal matters for the people of Israel, but they were also leaders (usually military) who helped draw the people back to God when they strayed. When the people started worshipping other gods or forgot the promises God made to them, they would lose the land they were living on and would need someone to lead them as they worked to regain it. Judges describes the experiences of many of these judges. Only one was a woman and her name was Deborah. The story we'll read today is about the period of time when Deborah led God's people.

Read aloud Judges 4 (or a children's Bible retelling of the text). After reading, ask your children what they noticed about the way Deborah led God's people. How did she help them make decisions? Did she lead alone or did she partner with other leaders? How did God help her lead? Draw your children's attention to the fact that God chose Deborah as the person to deliver messages to the people, including Barak, the leader of the army. Deborah and Barak work together to reclaim the Promised Land for the people. Then, ask your children to reflect on what Deborah's leadership can teach us about how we . can be leaders. Encourage them to notice her willingness to listen to God and share God's words, as well as her collaboration with Barak.

Continue exploring the idea of women as leaders with your children by creating a visual representation of past and present leaders whose work has influenced your family. Begin by gathering the supplies you'll need to create this piece of art: paper, glue, scissors and crayons or markers. Ask your child to draw a large cloud on one of the pieces of paper. It should be large enough to fill the paper. Explain that this cloud represents the "cloud of witnesses" — people who are no longer with us who helped create God's kingdom on earth during their lifetimes. While there are many different people in this "cloud of witnesses," ask your children to focus on the women. Together brainstorm a list of people who are part of this cloud. Encourage your children to not just think of well-known female leaders, but also those within their own communities and families. They may also want to include women from the Bible who served as leaders. Then, have vour children write the names of these women or draw pictures of them in the cloud. As they add each woman, talk about the ways she did God's work. When they have filled the cloud with names, ask your children to cut it out using the scissors and to glue it at the top of another, larger sheet of paper.

Repeat this activity focusing on women who are alive today and are helping to build God's kingdom. Have your children write their names or draw pictures of them in the space underneath the cloud. When the piece is completed, hang it somewhere in your home where it can serve as a reminder of the many women God calls to lead

and nurture us. You may want to periodically select one or more of the women to pray for during your family's prayer time.

2020 has definitely been an interesting year that has enabled us to look at different ways of getting things done effectively! I apologize to the leadership coordinators for not being more active with my communications these past months. For those of you in the roles of keeping the different congregations connected with PW in the Presbytery, I am sharing these recommendations with you again:

- Make phone calls to the congregational PW moderators just to see how they are doing. We know most are unable to meet in person. Ask them how they have handled "staying connected while distanced" these past months and if it has been effective. Let them know you value their feedback and that you are mainly calling to let them know you are thinking about them and that you want to stay connected during these challenging circumstances.
- Send Moderators a card and include something that will be uplifting and supportive for them in their PW leadership role. The "old fashioned" US mail still works and is frequently viewed as a more personal touch than an email. There are also PW note cards available on www.presbyterianwomen.org under "resources" if you'd prefer it to be identified as a PW note.
- Share information about the current PW Bible Study, Into the Light: Finding Hope Through Prayers of Lament, and the many resources available to work through this study in the coming year. (See my notes below for suggestions.) It is never too late to start the Bible Study.
- Pray for Presbyterian Women in our congregations, Presbytery, Synod and nationally!

The 2020-2021 PW/Horizons Bible Study, Into the Light: Finding Hope Through Prayers of Lament, is our current Bible Study. Some of our Presbytery PW participated in the online 2-hr. introduction and review of this Bible Study which was provided by Lynn Miller through our staff in Louisville.

Multiple resources for circles and Bible leaders are available online at presbyterianwomen.org under Bible Study Products. This includes a DVD of the study, posters, etc. The Workshop for Leaders, written by Joyce MacKichan Walker, is a lesson plan for Bible leaders. It includes activities that explore and resources to support the 2020-2021 PW/Horizons Bible study, Into the Light: Finding Hope Through Prayers of Lament, and is available at no charge.

Explore new and different ways to gather, even if virtually, to share this timely Bible Study with your PW. You could even purchase the DVD for your PW and share throughout the year if you are unable to meet in person or electronically. I have purchased all of the recommended books suggested to explore "lament."

I have participated on 2 webinars presented by PW, Inc. One was an in-depth review of the entire Bible Study and one presented music associated with our current Bible Study. I mentioned in our last PW CT call, and offer again, that I am most willing to facilitate an "online Zoom Bible Study" for anyone that might be interested. Please share this opportunity with your various PW Moderators. This is also available to other CT members. This is an alternative way for PW to fellowship, virtually, and study together. It can be adapted to once a month, 2 times a month, once a week, whatever works for the majority. To be most effective, it does require a computer or a smart phone to effectively participate via Zoom. I'm looking at starting in January. Please let me know if interested.

Nancy Meehan Yeo also presented an introduction to the PW Bible Study for PW in Shenandoah Presbytery via Zoom. It was a small group, but an interesting review of Into the Light. This is a recorded introduction and can still be viewed.

I will gladly assist anyone who is interested in looking for new and creative ways to participate in the upcoming Bible Study or to effectively fellowship as PW during the COVID pandemic. I'm here to help as we wade through these challenges.

The PW Churchwide Gathering is still scheduled for August 5-8, 2021 in St. Louis, Missouri. The Churchwide Coordinating Team will be voting in December to determine the viability of this event for 2021. I'll keep you posted!

- One washcloth
- One wide-tooth comb removed from the package
- One fingernail or toenail clipper removed from the package (either one is acceptable)
- One bath-size bar of soap in the original package
- One toothbrush in the original package
- Ten standard size Band-Aids

SCHOOL KITS:

- One pair of blunt scissors removed from the package (rounded tip, only)
- Three 70-count bound notebooks or notebooks totaling 200-210 pages (no loose-leaf or filler paper)
- One 30-centimeter / 12" ruler
- One hand-held pencil sharpener removed from the package
- One large eraser (no pencil cap erasers)
- Six new, unsharpened pencils with erasers (please remove pencils from the package)
- One box of 24 crayons (only 24)
- One 12"x14" to 14"x17" finished size cotton or lightweight canvas bag with handles (solid col or or kid-friendly fabric, no logos, reusable shopping bags or backpacks)
