## **COLLIERSTOWN BLANKET INITIATIVE WRAPS UP A RECORD!**

January 17, 2021 was "Blanket Sunday" at the Collierstown Presbyterian Church. The CPC Presbyterian Women annually set aside a Sunday in January to encourage the church family to donate funds to purchase blankets for distribution by Church World Service to needy people in the United States and around the world. This year's goal was to raise \$1050 to purchase 105 CWS blankets. We hoped to make the possibilities of a days, our Night Circle initiated a candlelight blanket a reality for more people whether the recipients used them for warmth, shelter, storage, or protection. We also wanted our blankets to be a way of covering those who received them with God's love. We committed to "Dream Big" and "Give More"! Our Church family and the students in The Pike, our pandemic learning pod, embraced this commitment and raised a record breaking total of \$2000 in three weeks making it possible to purchase 200 CWS blankets. We were humbled at what can be done when we open ourselves to God and let Him work through each of us. We were also amazed by this outcome as our Session decided to return to virtual worship services for five weeks beginning January 17, our Blanket Sunday dedication date, and continuing that format until February 14. Even in the face of the obstacle of not gathering in person the giving seemed to overflow in greater amounts. Our joy has been great as we experienced this outpouring of love and generosity for those in need even when we could not come together as a group.



Our PW has two Circles that are continuing to study "Into the Light" Finding Hope Through Pravers of Lament. Those that are members of the Night Circle that have been comfortable meeting in person according to the CDC guidelines have done so airing their study on Facebook Live. The response has been overwhelming with over two hundred men and women viewing the evening's lesson. We are finding our virtual outreach extends far and wide.

As the specter of COVID in mid-January reached two families in our congregation within several congregational gathering outside the homes of those families one evening. The group wore masks and socially distanced to sing hymns, offer a prayer, and pass along bags of cards with encouragement, scripture, and drawings by children. For those families and those in attendance it was a tangible time of love, care, and support. One family experienced loss and the other's family member is still critically ill, but those families have marveled at the strength they were given that night by the church family.

Collierstown PW has now turned its attention to our church's annual food drive in support of the "Souper Bowl of Caring" initiative. It has as its theme "Bridging the Gap" for those with food needs. Collierstown Presbyterian Church is located on Turnpike Road and sits across the Colliers Creek. A state maintained bridge connects the church to Turnpike Road. This year church members plan to use the bridge as our food collection site on Saturday, February 6 from 11:00 a.m. until 1:00 p.m. We are asking the church family, our Pike Pod students, friends, neighboring churches and residents of Lexington and Rockbridge County to bring boxes and bags of canned food, paper products, and monetary gifts to FILL THE BRIDGE and provide for the food needs of others. . Donations will be divided and distributed to RARA (Rockbridge Area Relief Association), Helping Hands-a food ministry of Fairfield Presbyterian Church, and the food bank of the Gospel Way Church of God in Christ located in Lexington.



Daily we seem to be reminded that when everything in our world seems to be breaking down, we must secure our heart, our emotions, and our mind to the reality our God is always with us. He is good and He is in control. Psalm 91:4 reminds us "He will cover you with His feathers; you will take refuge under His wings. His faithfulness will be a protective shield.

## From The Presbyterian Outlook

Christ gave us the ministry of reconciliation. The Bible tells us so. The word "reconciliation" is found only four times in the New Testament. Frankly, this fact surprised me. I often name the truth that we are united in Christ, noting further that such union is God's doing, not ours. Ours is to make manifest, with the help of the Spirit, the truth of that bond. But the word "reconciliation" is found a meager four times: twice in Romans and twice in 2 Corinthians. Further, only one of those instances has humans as actors rather than recipients. "Reconciled" appears six times, these instances emphasizing yet again God's doing. Reconciliation is about divine agency, not human activity.

My trusty Greek-English lexicon defines katallage (reconciliation) as the "reestablishment of an interrupted or broken relationship." A digital resource I like to use adds that reconciliation is an "exchange — especially of money." Hence, our understanding of redeemed, the price paid for us by Jesus in order that we might be reconciled to God. Again, God is the protagonist of this salvation story. My lexicon goes on to say that reconciliation, according to Paul, "is brought about by God alone." If this is so (and I believe it to be so), what then is this ministry of reconciliation we have received?

If reconciliation is God's work, what is ours? Surely gratitude and praise and worship of the God who makes a way to reestablish relationship with us. But what does this grace make possible not only between God and us, but between one another?

These wonders took me to the Sermon on the Mount, particularly Matthew 5:23-24. Jesus says: "So when you are offering your gift at the altar, if you remember that your brother or sister has something against you, leave your gift there before the altar and go; first be reconciled to your brother or sister, and then come and offer your gift." Here the word is a little different, it is diallasso: "to be reconciled" or "to be restored to normal relations or harmony with someone." This is a hapax legomenon, a word found only here in the entirety of the New Testament. This word is made up of two words put together: "because" and "to change." The implication is that in order for us to be reconciled to someone we harmed, real change must take place — perhaps even a material exchange is required to set things right. Reconciliation between human beings begins with repair. The unity won for us in Christ Jesus remains, our reconciliation to God is not our doing. However, Jesus' command to be reconciled to one another requires tangible, material action on the part of those who have injured their siblings. This should come as no surprise to us. Consider our most intimate relationships, those with our families and friends, when harm happens, a breach of trust, an injury inflicted, repair is inextricable from reconciliation. An honest attempt at making amends must be undertaken and is ongoing.

Christians' work at reparations, at repair, at making things right with those we have hurt, is embarked upon with the certainty that we have been justified by Christ and that does get undone by our wrongdoing, sin or finitude. Hence, we need not succumb to cynicism, despair or resignation. We tackle the hard work of repairing the breach and restoring our city streets with sure and certain knowledge that we are reconciled to God through Christ, and therefore we need not fear the vulnerability of honest confession, the change required of real repentance and the material exchange needed to be truly reconciled to one another. Jennifer Harvey, in her book, "Dear White Christians: For Those Still Longing for Racial Reconciliation," argues that the paradigm of reconciliation has failed and that a paradigm of reparations is needed if we are to heal "deep racial wounds." She writes: "Living into a reparations paradigm is difficult. It requires dwelling in painful truths. But it is honest and truthful in ways that, I am convinced, are potentially liberating and transformative for all of us." We can enter this difficult, holy work of repair with confidence in the One through whom we have been reconciled to God.

# Faithful Ideas for Lent in a Virtual World

#### Ash Wednesday-

Ash Wednesday, (this year February 17) is the start of Lent. Many faith communities meet for a service of worship, repentance, and preparation. Often this includes the imposition of ashes, a reminder of mourning, repentance, and our mortality.

In this season of pandemic, in person, imposition of ashes is not recommended- not even with Qtips, gloved hands, or outdoor worship. Many faith leaders and educators are turning to ways to support families in at home worship.

If you send ashes home for people to use, PLEASE remind them that ashes should be mixed with OIL- not water, as ash + water = lye, and will burn the skin.

Others are leaning on the "dust/dirt" part of our understanding, that humans are made both of the dirt of the earth and the breath of God—and sending home bags of potting soil and seeds, to be planted at the beginning of Lent, and bloom 40 days later- at Easter.

## Here are some ideas for Lenten at home devotions.

#### A 40 Day Lenten Activity Chain

Make a paper chain, with purple (days of Lent) and yellow strips of paper (Sundays in Lent), 47 strips of paper in total. Each week will have 6 purple links, then 1 yellow (for Sunday) except for the week beginning with Ash Wednesday- that will have 4 purple, and 1 yellow. Write simple activities to do during those days: pray for a friend, give/send a postcard to a shut in, fast from junk food, sing a song of praise, etc. Make the paper chain, then each day take off a link to do the activity.
