LADIES FROM IVANHOE PC SHARE

I asked several of our PW at Ivanhoe Church to tell what they hoped to see from PW this coming year. The last suggestion is one that I have also hoped to see happen for several years. We realize that in early historical times, women were often treated as property and not respected in any part of their lives, much less in the church. We have come a long way since those days and it is wonderful that so many women have emerged as dynamic pastors and leaders of the church everywhere.

However, it seems like in some churches, the pendulum has swung far enough over to the extreme other side, and men have decided to just "sit back" and remain unseen, not fulfilling their role as leaders of the church. Why can there

not be a healthy balance between the two- just as balance is needed in a relationship and/or family unit?

When attempting to organize a workshop with this topic for Fall Gatherings, I was met with the" deer-in-headlights" syndrome from both men and women. Call it "old fashioned" but my childhood memories of the church where I grew up, are filled with the realization that there was a strong balance between the men and women spiritual leaders and participants of our church. for Sunday School and Worship Services. As a result, there was also a strong group of young people who grew spiritually and became the next generation of congregations.

Even with our family structures changing and presenting more challenges perhaps there is a way to bring more men back to the church in mind, body, and spirit, and a way that they can make the women and children's roles even stronger for Jesus Christ.

COLLIERSTOWN PRESBYTERIAN WOMEN REACH OUT TO THOSE IN NEED

The Collierstown Presbyterian Women have completed a very busy Winter Quarter. Additional contributions to our record breaking Blanket Sunday campaign were given in early February bringing our donation total to \$2330, an increase of \$330 above what was reported in the February issue of SUNRISE. The additional funds enabled the purchase of 233 Church World Service blankets for distribution, 128 more than the goal we had set in January. We were truly touched by the generosity of our church family, our Pike learning pod students, and the community's support.

As February got underway the PW turned its attention to supporting our church's annual food drive that had as its theme "Bridging the Gap" for those with food needs. The goal of the food campaign was to use the state maintained bridge connecting the church to Turnpike Rd as the collection site on Saturday, February 6 for this year's initiative in support of the national "Souper Bowl of Caring" effort. On that day twenty-five volunteers from PW, the church membership, our Pike Pod families, and friends and neighbors were on hand to receive donations that lined both sides of our bridge. An amazing total of \$1480 in monetary gifts were given along with over 1200 lbs. of canned foods and other food items between 11:00 a.m. and 1:00 p.m. that day. The donations were divided and delivered on Tuesday, February 11 to the Rockbridge Area Relief Association (RARA), the food bank of the Gospel Way Church of God in Christ located in Lexington, and to Helping Hands, a food ministry of the Fairfield Presbyterian Church. The goal had been to help supply and assist those in our area with needed food and support. Each dollar given and each food item donated was one more way to cover our neighbors and those in the surrounding area with God's love. We were especially grateful to Goad's Body

Shop and the Cattlemans Market for providing additional locations for donations to be left. Our CPC family, the Pike Pod, neighboring Collierstown and Buffalo community churches as well as friends and neighbors made it possible to reach across the gap to provide for those in need.

The outpouring of giving during these two initiatives was made even more remarkable as our church building was closed to in person worship services. The level of participation and the generosity displayed gave evidence to the fact that a church is not a building but a people committed to Christ and to serving others in His name.

Our Presbyterian Women will be holding our spring meeting on Thursday, April 22. In addition to our usual business relating to spring and summer activities, recognition of our 2021 high school seniors, and a review of the ministries we support, we will be discussing the future of our Annual Church Dinner scheduled for Saturday, November 6. This event is sponsored by PW but is a total church undertaking. It has been a source of fellowship and outreach for the church family for close to a century. It was not held in 2020 due to the COVID crisis. We are exploring ways it could be adapted to safely extend hospitality to those who come to enjoy delicious food in a welcoming setting. We would appreciate your prayer support as we look to the Lord for direction in this regard.

We know the answer to fear in an increasingly terrifying world is to join our hearts to the unfailing character of God. David, the Psalmist, reminds us in Psalm 27:1 "The Lord is my light and my salvation; whom shall I fear? The Lord is the stronghold of my life; of whom shall I be afraid? We are going forward secure in this certainty. We will chart our course based on His direction and leading.

<u>Search Committee</u> (subcommittee that met) – Pam and Karen and Paula discussed the CT vacancies on January 7^{th.} With the absence of a Search Committee, A few volunteered at the November meeting to meet and came up with a recommendation to fill in the gaps on CT. The proposal set forth and decided upon would be to divide up the current coverage of mission communities to additional churches/areas and also be covered by the existing mission community leaders. With these additional churches to be assigned, there would be a reduction in communication with the churches to keep the workload down. They would be letting the church moderator or group contacts know that they were a resource and making a newsletter available to them twice a year, which will be created by Pam & Karen (the subcommittee). Joyce Anderson is taking Augusta Highland E1 and E2 as a new leadership coordinator. Paula would keep Eastern Panhandle and pick up Potomac Highlands. Mountain and Central valley will be Donna Parker. Pam is Highland E3 and Karen is Maury River. This would be streamlining from 7 to 5 people to cover the mission communities. Then switching to 4 with Pat Wichael coming off as a leadership coordinator as of April 1. This action is in response to the lack of people who will volunteer at this time. It was presented and voted upon to have these inter-team changes come into effect as of April 1st and be reflected in the directory to correspond with that date.

SEARCH COMMITTEE Does NEED PEOPLE

Pam Snyder - Leadership Coordinator Report for the Mission Community Coordinators

We are starting off into another year of PW in Shenandoah Presbytery. While 2020 definitely presented new challenges, it looks as though we will continue to find new ways to "do PW" in 2021! The role of the newly adopted "Mission Community Coordinators" is to serve as the link between Presbyterian Women in the congregations and the PW Coordinating Team. My role as Leadership Coordinator is to stay connected with the Mission Community Coordinators and help strengthen the PW leaders network within Shenandoah Presbytery. For those of you in the roles of keeping the different congregations connected with PW in the Presbytery, here are a few recommendations to help you, including a few repeats:

- Make phone calls to the congregational PW moderators just to see how they are doing. We know most are unable
 to meet in person. Ask them what they have done to stay connected while distanced, and if it has been effective.
 Let them know you value their feedback and that you are mainly calling to let them know you are thinking about them
 and that you want to stay connected and be a resource for them and their PW group.
- <u>Send Moderators a card</u> and include something that will be uplifting and supportive for them in their PW leadership
 role. The "old fashioned" US mail still works and is frequently viewed as a more personal touch than an email.
 There are also PW note cards available on <u>www.presbyterianwomen.org</u>under "resources" if you'd prefer it to be
 identified as a PW note.
- <u>Share information about the current PW Bible Study</u>, *Into the Light: Finding Hope Through Prayers of Lament*, and the many resources available to work through this study in the coming year. (See my notes below for suggestions.) It is never too late to start the Bible Study.
- Share what some other PW groups are doing: One PW group started a Cookie Ministry for their congregation. Bake cookies, wrap them in individual resealable storage bags, and deliver them to members of your church family. We are all missing the fellowship of regular worship services, PW meetings, etc. Justmask up, stop by, socially distance on the porch and catch up for a few minutes. This is a great way to fellowship with your PW members or other members of your congregation.
- <u>For Mission Community Coordinators:</u> Consider hosting a Zoom meeting of all leaders in your Mission Community. I can assist, as can Presbytery staff, in helping deliver a Zoom meeting. Make it a social time, to get to know each and build relationships the first time. Keep it to an hour. Then perhaps build a targeted subject for another Zoom event and focus on recommendations from the Moderators/leaders to help meet their needs. If only 3-4 participate, it is progress. Don't give up!
- Pray for Presbyterian Women in our congregations, Presbytery, Synod and nationally!

This includes a DVD of the study, posters, etc. The Workshop for Leaders, written by Joyce MacKichan Walker, is a lesson plan for Bible leaders. It includes activities that explore and resources to support the 2020-2021 PW/Horizons Bible study, Into the Light: Finding Hope Through Prayers of Lament, and is available at no charge.

I mentioned in our last PW CT call, and offer again, that I am most willing to facilitate an "online Zoom Bible Study" for anyone that might be interested. Please share this opportunity with your various PW Moderators. This is also available to other CT members. This is an alternative way for PW to fellowship, virtually, and study together. It can be adapted to once a month, 2 times a month, once a week, whatever works for the majority. To be most effective, it does require a computer or a smart phone to effectively participate via Zoom. Please let me know if interested.

- One washcloth
- One wide-tooth comb removed from the package
- One fingernail or toenail clipper removed from the package (either one is acceptable)
- One bath-size bar of soap in the original package
- One toothbrush in the original package
- Ten standard size Band-Aids

SCHOOL KITS:

- One pair of blunt scissors removed from the package (rounded tip, only)
- Three 70-count bound notebooks or notebooks totaling 200-210 pages (no loose-leaf or filler paper)
- One 30-centimeter / 12" ruler
- One hand-held pencil sharpener removed from the package
- One large eraser (no pencil cap erasers)
- Six new, unsharpened pencils with erasers (please remove pencils from the package)
- One box of 24 crayons (only 24)
- One 12"x14" to 14"x17" finished size cotton or lightweight canvas bag with handles (solid color or kid-friendly fabric, no logos, reusable shopping bags or backpacks)
