COLLIERSTOWN PRESBYTERIAN WOMEN TO HOST THEIR ANNUAL CHURCH DINNER

In April the CPC Presbyterian Women and the Annual Church Dinner Steering Committee met to discuss the feasibility of holding the Annual Church Dinner on November 6, 2021, as planned following the cancellation of last year's event. After much prayer and discussion it was decided the Annual Dinner will be back with modifications as a result of the increased numbers of vaccinations, changes to the recommended health guidelines, and the decrease in the numbers of COVID-19 cases.

As of now the <u>Annual Dinner will be a "take-out" event</u> with meals being ordered and purchased in advance online or by phone prior to the Annual Dinner date. Patrons will have the opportunity to order meals indicating the number and type of meats requested and choice of potato.

All side dishes and a cake dessert will be included with each meal. Patrons will be asked to indicate a desired pick up time so meals will be ready.

Again this year the day will feature a Bazaar containing bread, baked goods, assorted food items, homemade soups, crafts, fresh vegetables, and seasonal decorations for sale. The Bazaar will be held on the church grounds and in the Bazaar building.

Since 1925 the Annual Church Dinner has offered the CPC family a wonderful way to extend hospitality to the community and surrounding area while providing an opportunity for the church family to fellowship and enjoy working together while serving others. The mission has not changed only the method of delivery. The Annual Church Dinner is sponsored by the Presbyterian Women but is a total church effort with CPC men, women, youth, and children working together. Proceeds from the dinner are used to fund mission projects locally and abroad. We look forward to this opportunity to witness to our faith as we serve others.

In May the PW celebrated the birthday of the PW organization by inviting the entire church family to give a monetary gift to their annual Birthday Offering. A total of \$475.00 was donated on Mother's Day to support two ministries in the United States and one in Nkhoma, Malawi designated as this year's Birthday Offering recipients.

In May the two Presbyterian Women's Circles concluded their study of P. Lynn Miller's "Into the Light-Finding Hope Through Prayers of Lament." The Night Circle met in person each month for those comfortable wearing masks and social distancing. They also offered their study virtually on Facebook Live attracting participants from both Circles, the congregation, and the community. The two Circles have begun preparations for the 2021-22 Bible study year set to begin in September. There is much interest in "What My Grandmothers Taught Me" by Merryl Blair. We are looking forward to studying the Women in Matthew's Genealogy of Jesus.

On May 23, Pentecost Sunday, three members of the Rockbridge County High School Class of 2021 were honored during the 11:00 a.m.

worship service by the Presbyterian Women on their upcoming graduation from Rockbridge County High School. They will participate in graduation exercises held at Rockbridge County High School on Friday evening, June 4. The graduates were presented with the gift of a personalized English Standard Version Study Bible. Those young people included Braden Gualtieri who will be attending Bridgewater College, Harper Knick who will be a student at James Madison University, and Lindsey Ramsey who will be enrolling in the Staunton School of Cosmetology.

As we have moved into late spring the Presbyterian Women have been creative in hosting three wedding showers as a drive-by event or an outdoors celebration on the church grounds. We continue to stay connected by text feeds, email, Zoom, and Facebook Live. We are worshipping in person in the sanctuary and broadcast all services virtually. Our church will host Camp Daniel, a summer camp for children and youth, three days a week during the month of June from 8:15 a.m. until 2:30 p.m. Our PW will be there to support the students and staff in a variety of ways. We are grateful for the way we have been joined or "knitted together" during this time of adversity in order to minister and witness to those in our community and beyond.

Commission on the Status of Women Goes Virtual in 2021!

The Commission on the Status of Women (CSW65) returned this year after the cancellation of the event for 2020 due to COVID-19. The theme was Women in Public Life - Equal Participation in Decision-Making. The event ran from March 15-26th. While I was skeptical of how this intense event would effectively happen virtually, I was pleasantly surprised at how smoothly all went and the cost savings incurred by not traveling to New York city. It was also much less physically exhausting! An event that was projected to have approximately 8,000 participants from around the world blossomed into over 27,000 participants! Going virtual allowed many to participate who otherwise would not have been able to due to travel VISA issues, expense, physical limitations, etc. Note that both PCUSA and Presbyterian Women hold NGO status through ECOSOC.

On Friday, March 12, 2021, the PCUSA and PW Delegations met virtually for a worship and orientation session. This was led by our PCUSA staff located in NY at the Presbyterian Ministry at the United Nations. While I missed the precious gift of being in community together, it was wonderful to "see" many whom I have worked with throughout my 12 years as a delegate to the CSW at the UN.

One of my favorite events was our daily morning devotional. Each morning at 8 a.m. we joined by Zoom to sing, dance, praise God and worship together virtually. Yes - we danced in our living rooms, bedrooms, kitchens - wherever we were viewing! This time together was so energizing and inspirational and really set a positive note for each day. I was especially pleased to be able to participate in the Ecumenical Women's CSW65 choir. This unique opportunity taught me how to learn the music electronically, practice, then video myself and submit my alto part for each song. Our wonderful director of music at the Church Center then combined everyone's videos and presented our music during the devotionals. It worked and was beautiful! I have so missed singing with the Second Presbyterian Chancel

Choir members and playing in our sanctuary dur- engage – be informed of the issues ing our COVID months.

This provided a wonderful outlet for me to reconnect to the music.

Even though I was still working full-time, I was able to participate in many parallel events and side events being streamed from the United Nations and various other locations around the world. One that especially impressed me was Girls on Fire which was an excellent intergenerational panel and call to action presented by the Salvation Army. We heard from Girls International, which is a US organization specifically designed for girls in middle school and high school who are challenged with domestic violence. They shared that 1 in 5 children are exposed to intimate violence in the home and 1 in 3 high school girls are abused by their boyfriends. They encouraged us to educate ourselves, listen to the young girls and help amplify girl's voices - not speak for them. COVID has put these issues on steroids as the number of abused girls has doubled in the past year. These young girls and young women need us to advocate on their behalf. Another excellent opportunity was the event sponsored by the PCUSA - Women Leading in the Church. This diverse panel provided conversations on the progress and challenges of women in leadership in the church. I was surprised at what many women have experienced as they have moved into what was once more traditionally male roles. We were all challenged to help build up the confidence of all people who feel called to ministry especially women and women of color.

The PCUSA and PW delegates all left invigorated, educated while knowing our job is to continue to advocate for gender equality and putting an end to gender based violence. Advocacy is a form of worship. So what we call do even in the midst of a pandemic?

Wear black on Thursdays to resist rape and all forms of violence against women and girls

Write letters to local and national governments

Volunteer with grass roots organizations

Practice the ministry of presence: be present –

Be an ambassador for Christ! Make room for everyone as Jesus did!

Dance! Look for/Google the song/dance video of the Masaka Kids Afrikana sharing the song Jerusalema. They taught us that difficult times require fierce dancing!

Stand in solidarity against gender-based violence.

Pam Snyder - Leadership Coordinator Report for the Mission Community Coordinators **Leadership Coordinator Report May 2021**

As a reminder, the role of the newly adopted "Mission Community Coordinators" is to serve as the link between Presbyterian Women in the congregations and the PW Coordinating Team. My role as Leadership Coordinator is to stay connected with the Mission Community Coordinators and help strengthen the PW leaders network within Shenandoah Presbytery. For those of you in the roles of keeping the different congregations connected with PW in the Presbytery, here are a few recommendations to help you, including a few repeats:

Continue to connect with the congregational PW moderators

This can be a simple phone call to touch base or send a card or post card reminding them that you are a resource. This is especially important since many congregations have not held in-person PW and circle meetings during the pandemic.

Share information about the current PW Bible Study, Into the Light: FindingHope Through Prayers of Lament, and new 2021-2022 Bible Study, What My Grandmothers Taught Me: Learning from the Women in-Matthew's Genealogy of Jesus by Merryl Blair.

<u>Share what some other PW groups are doing:</u> When you talk with PW moderators, ask them what they have been doing these past months and share with others. Everyone is looking for a way to provide mission and ministry in their congregations and communities!

<u>For Mission Community Coordinators:</u> Consider hosting a Zoom meeting of all leaders in your Mission Community. I can assist, as can Presbytery staff, in helping deliver a Zoom meeting. Make it a social time, to get to know each and build relationships the first time. Keep it to an hour. Then perhaps build a targeted subject for another Zoom event and focus on recommendations from the Moderators/leaders to help meet their needs. If only 3-4 participate, it is progress. Don't give up!

Pray for Presbyterian Women in our congregations, Presbytery, Synod and nationally!

2021 PW Churchwide Gathering Update! The triennial Business Meeting will be held online August 4 and 5, 2021. During these sessions, PW, Inc. voting representatives will vote on leaders, business and a budget for the national organization.

Commission on the Status of Women:

Once again, I was selected as a PW delegate to the Commission on the Status of Women at the United Nations. This is an excellent opportunity for PW to participate on a global level to advocate for gender equity and to address all forms of violence against women and girls. This event was cancelled in 2020 but was held virtually this year. The 2021 theme was *Women in Public Life: EqualParticipation in Decision-Making* and was held March 15-26, 2021. It was a wonderful opportunity to meet as women of faith as PW in the PCUSA, to worship with women globally, to participate in a variety of parallel events and side events provided through many advocacy groups and the United Nations. Over 25,000 were able to participate in this virtual event, compared to approximately 8,000 that would have attended in person. As one new delegate shared, "attending CSW is like trying to drink water from a fire hose!" There are events going on all day and into the night and it is sometimes difficult to choose to participate due to so many available opportunities and the brain's ability to absorb it all. As always, I'm here to assist anyone who is interested in looking for new and creative ways to participate in the current Bible Study or to effectively fellowship as PW during the continuing COVID pandemic. Let's identify unique ways to effectively continue to do the work of Presbyterian Women.
