COLLIERSTOWN "KICKS OFF" SUMMER WITH CAMP DANIEL

Summer got off to an exciting start at the

Collierstown Presbyterian Church as its doors were opened to "Camp Daniel", a summer camp for children and youth that focused on the life of Daniel found in the Old Testament. Campers spent three days a week, Tuesday through Thursday, from 8:15 a.m. until 2:30 p.m. during the month of June engaged in Bible study, music, crafts, recreation, hiking, and community service. Each week a different aspect of the character of Daniel was explored and studied. Campers learned about courage, citizenship, charity, and creativity discussing its evidence in the life of Daniel and applying it personally to their own lives and families. Campers initiated a "penny challenge" in which the boys raised \$150.20 and the girls donated \$151.00 to give to Project Horizon, a local shelter for women and children fleeing domestic violence. The PW and members of the congregation became involved also, donating personal hygiene kits, paper towels, trash bags, and dish detergent for use at Project Horizon. Under the leadership of Kelly Harris, CPC Music Director, campers enjoyed singing while they worked and made the "Camp Daniel Song" one heard at church, in the car, and at home. The entire camp, staff members, and parents traveled by charter bus to Washington DC on June 24. They enjoyed an unforgettable day at the Bible Museum. On Thursday, July 1 Camp Daniel welcomed families of campers, friends of the church, and the congregation to a closing program followed by a covered dish dinner for all. Campers sang songs and took part in activities conveying the camp experience. Each camper was recognized and presented with a certificate of completion by teachers Annabelle Smith and Martha Bodnar. Students were also given a personal copy of the Bible donated in memory of Nelson Hall, a church member and supporter of Weekday Religious Education.

The Presbyterian Women and the Collierstown Church family are now focusing on the PW's annual "School Bag" campaign set to begin officially on August 1. Each year PW member Louise Tardy makes canvas tote bags and provides lists of supplies to be purchased and placed in each bag. The filled bags will be returned to the church by August 29 to be distributed by Church World Service to needy students in the United States and around the world. The church community has also been invited to participate in this effort along with the Collierstown United Methodist Church that has partnered with CPC in the past.

Plans for the return of the Collierstown Annual Church Dinner continue to move forward. This year's event will be held on November 6, 2021. As of now the Annual Dinner will be a "take-out" event with meals being ordered and purchased in advance online or by phone prior to the Annual Dinner date. Patrons will have the opportunity to order meals indicating the number and type of meats requested and choice of potato. All side dishes and a cake dessert will be included with each meal. Since 1925 the Annual Church Dinner has been a wonderful way to extend hospitality to the community and surrounding area while giving the church family an opportunity to work and fellowship together. A bazaar containing baked goods, homemade soups, crafts, fresh vegetables, and seasonal decorations for sale will be held on the church grounds on Dinner Day. Proceeds from the day are used to fund PW mission projects locally and abroad.

The Collierstown congregation has continued to study and discuss God's Word by using ZOOM to participate in a weekly Wednesday night Bible study led by Rev. Kevin Channell. The two Presbyterian Women Circles are preparing to begin the 2021-22 Horizons Bible study entitled "What My Grandmothers Taught Me" by Merryl Blair. Both will meet in person at the church. The Night Circle will meet the first Thursday of the month at 6:30 p.m. for a light supper followed by the Bible study at 7:00 p.m. The C & F Circle will gather at 1:00 p.m. on the third Tuesday for the Bible Study followed by a hospitality time. During the height of the COVID-19 crisis the Night Circle began airing the monthly Bible study on Facebook Live and has decided to continue that practice. Originally intended for members who couldn't physically attend the study, the virtual attendance increased dramatically with participants joining the group from a multi-state area. The practice born out of necessity is now considered a great blessing for all. Those interested in being a part

of the virtual study are invited to join the Night Circle on the first Thursday of each month at 7:00 p.m. on the CPC Facebook page.

As summer draws closer to fall, we reflect on the many blessings we have experienced in the last two months . . . returning to our sanctuary for worship, singing together, taking the last Sunday of each summer month to worship outside on the lawn, enjoying Lemonade on the Lawn each week, having children in and outside our building laughing, learning, and sharing together. We are anticipating and are excited about worshiping together at nearby Lake Robertson on August 22 and enjoying our Annual Church Picnic. We have been a church family that had members recover from COVID but we have also lost members to the virus and to other illnesses. We have celebrated engagements, wedding, and graduations. Our greatest joy however has come from experiencing God's faithfulness each day in all circumstances.
