"I wonder...."

In the Godly Play approach to faith formation, we hear a Bible story, and then wonder about it.

We ask questions not to gain a specific answer, or to grow in fact finding, but to wonder, to sit with the story and with God, to wonder about God and ourselves. It is a holy question, this "I wonder..."

Wondering is part of the process of adaptive change. Wondering can be part of testing the spirits. (I John 4:1). As Sessions become bodies of discernment, rather than only decision making bodies, we have to wonder...together. (https://www.leaderwise.org/?

mc_cid=505dc6915e&mc_eid=3fe40926de) And covid has certainly pushed us into both decision making and discernment.

My own children used to mock me if I did too much "I wonderings..." as I was teaching, but I believe it is valuable tool to move us from simply deciding things (although there are times when decisions must be made) into discernment. Wonderings take time, but can also come in the spark of the moment, a gift from the Holy Spirit.

Try this with your Session, your committee, your church: "I wonder what new thing God is calling us to next?"

"I wonder what we are learning in this time?"

"I wonder what being faithful to God and to each other looks like now?"

and "I wonder how we can best exhibit the Kingdon of Heaven to our neighbors right now?"


May God bless us in our wonderings, together.



Mandatory Boundary Training in October

Boundary Training will take place via Zoom, on Tuesday October 19, 10 am-1 pm, <u>OR</u> Saturday, October 23, 10 am-1 pm. Participants may choose one date; attendance at both is not necessary. There is no fee for this training, and a certificate will be mailed to you after completion.

Shenandoah Presbytery requires that all Congregational Leaders (Teaching Elders, Commissioned Ruling Elders, and those "At Large") take part in a Mandatory Boundary Training every 3 years. If you have not taken a Boundary Training with Shenandoah Presbytery, you are required to do so, per Shenandoah Presbytery Policy. For those who took Boundary Training in Shenandoah Presbytery in 2018, you are due to renew. Congregation members and Ruling Elders are also welcome.

Healthy churches and healthy people have good boundaries. To register, contact Donna at shenpres@shenpres.org.

The training will be led by Rev. Dr. Nancy Meehan Yao, Associate General Presbyter, and Rev. Dr. Seth Normington, who is the pastor at Cooks Creek Church in Harrisonburg. Seth received his Doctor of Ministry from Fuller Seminary where he focused on lifelong leadership development, mentoring, and coaching pastors and leaders. He coaches cross country and track at Bridgewater College, officiates track nationally, and tries to run himself occasionally. He is a certified leadership and personal development coach and certified to teach Healthy Boundaries by the FaithTrust Institute. He lives in Harrisonburg with his wife, Gemma, an artist and teacher, and they have three grown children.

Committee on Nominations

The Nominations Committee is looking for a few good women and men to serve on our presbytery's committees which assist us in local and worldwide mission activities, help develop and take care of our congregations and pastors, prepare ministry candidates and support the presbytery's staff and its overall work.

If you or any member of your church has gifts and/or interest in serving the Lord through Shenandoah Presbytery, please contact us (see below). Some but not all committees prefer to have ordained persons (ruling elders and teaching elders). Our committee attempts to maintain proper member representation standards on each committee. Most of the committees meet via ZOOM. While most committees have standard meeting days and times, a few convene at the members' convenience (see below). You can look up each committee on the presbytery's website and see their purpose, duties and the name and contact information for the committee chair. The committee chair will then relay your interest and contact information to the Nominations Committee. Or you may directly contact the Nominations Committee chair, Brad Langdon (see below).

Presently, the Nominations Committee is looking for potential committee candidates for the Class of 2024 (three-year term), although other shorter one-year and two-year terms are also available on some committees.

We are also gearing up for the General Assembly meeting in 2022, and have begun soliciting interest from anyone interested in applying to be nominated as a General Assembly (GA) commissioner, alternate GA commissioner, or Youth Advisory Delegate (YAD), and alternate YAD. Look for the application process to be detailed soon.

The Nominations Committee plans to present a slate of presbytery committee nominees at the November meeting of presbytery.

Refugee Resettlement at Massanetta Springs Needs Your Help

"For I was hungry, and you gave Me something to eat, I was thirsty, and you gave Me something to drink, I was a stranger, and you took Me in."

These are the words from Matthew 25 of Jesus calling us to welcome refugees to our community. I'm sure you are familiar with the news that there are many Afghans housed at several military bases in Virginia, who will need to be resettled. I wanted to take this time to share with you what is happening in our community in response.

Church World Service in Harrisonburg is the lead resettlement organization for the Shenandoah Valley. CWS expects approximately 100 Afghans to come to the Valley likely in mid-October.

CWS is working with Massanetta Springs to provide transitional housing for 60-90 days. When the Afghan families are ready to leave Massanetta Springs they will be resettled in towns up and down the valley.

We are already working together.

The cost of housing refugees at Massanetta Springs will be covered by a grant from CWS National. But the cost of providing food for 100 people for 2 to 3 months falls at somewhere between \$100,000 and \$150,000. CWS and Massanetta Springs are working to help reduce the costs and seeking donations to support food and other ancillary services. Presbytery's Committee on Mission and Outreach has created a sub-committee on Refugee Resettlement. Dave Thalman (dthalman@comcast.net) is the chair of that committee. Carolyn Thalman (cjthalman@comcast.net) is a member of the Presbyterian Disaster Assistance Refugee Ministry Team. Both Dave and Carolyn are available as resources for churches in the Presbytery that are interested in finding ways to welcome new neighbors to our communities.

On Oct 3, World Communion Sunday, we will receive the Peacemaking and Global Mission Offering – one of the four church wide offerings of the PCUSA. 50% of the offering goes to the Presbyterian Peacemaking Program, 25% goes to the Presbytery Peacemaking Program and 25% remains here in our community. What could be more Peacemaking and Global Mission than helping to resettle refugees? Consider designating your 25% of this year's Peacemaking Offering to go to CWS to help resettle refugees.

WHAT CAN CHURCHES DO?


- * Make a donation to CWS Harrisonburg (cwsharrisonburg.org) designated for Transitional Housing at Massanetta Springs.

The [CWS] Harrisonburg Immigration and Refugee office has resettled refugees since 1988 from Afghanistan, Azerbaijan, Belarus, Bosnia, Burma, Colombia, Congo (Kinshasa), Croatia, Cuba, Eritrea, Iran, Iraq, Kazakhstan, Kosovo, Russia, Rwanda, Serbia, Sierra Leone, Sudan, Tajikistan, Ukraine, and Uzbekistan within a 100 mile radius of our office. Our primary goal is to help the refugee form long lasting relationships in the community which become the basis of self-sufficiency. In order to reach this goal a family must be able to maintain their own basic needs in a sustainable lifestyle. Our program provides a bridge from their former life in their home country to a new set of cultural, linguistic, and practical skills that will enable them to be successful in Harrisonburg.
