
by zoom.

## What My Grandmother Taught Me



My grandmother, Frieda, was born in Germany. In 1900 she came to the U.S alone at the age of 19, knowing no English, but did have sponsors in Wilmington. I remember her as a fun Grandmom. I spent overnights on a bed so high I needed a stool to get up. We played Canasta and Parcheesi. I often begged her to bake rusk, a German bread. There was always a candy jar available. She was known around town as the "Avon Lady." She took in every stray animal that came by. Grandmom rarely spoke about her life in Germany. I only know that it was hard. She lost two sons as toddlers, and two more sons as adults. She grieved greatly, but persevered. She was feisty, strong, stubborn, trusting in the Lord, and always active. Still living in her own home at 92, she fell and broke her hip while dancing at a Senior Center, which led to her death. She never gave the skinny me advice, except to "put some meat on my bones." What I learned from her was a realization, more as an adult looking back, of what she overcame. While my life has been nothing like hers, I pray that as I age I can be as faithful and strong as she was.

The church family was joined by community families whose children had been a part of The Pike, a pandemic learning pod housed at CPC during the '20-21 school year and by those who attended Camp Daniel, the church's summer camp held the four weeks of June for ages four through fourteen. A humorous skit/dialog by Peter and Jean Cook introduced the worship hour as friendships were renewed and hearts were inspired for worship in the beautiful outdoor setting. Many lingered on into the afternoon as games and swimming in the Lake Robertson pool were enjoyed by all.

The PW concluded its annual "School Bag Campaign" on Sunday, August 29. One hundred canvas tote bags filled with basic school supplies were returned to the church sanctuary filling the first pew and the floor below it. The Collierstown United Methodist Church joined with CPC PW preparing twenty-one of the school bags that were assembled. Special thanks to PW member Louise Tardy and CUMC member Amy Hayslette for making the sturdy and attractive canvas bags that were filled with supplies. On September 13 the bags were transported to the Brethern Disaster Ministries building in Weyers Cave to begin their journey to Church World Service, the agency that distributes the school kits to needy students in the United States and around the world. The monetary gifts that were given to the School Bag campaign were given to CWS to cover the costs of shipping the bags to the locations where they are most needed. Each bag was sent on its way with a prayer that the student who received it will come to know Jesus. Many thanks to our Collierstown United Methodist friends who helped make this PW project a church and community wide effort!

The PW's Annual Church Dinner Steering Committee met and decided on Thursday, September 9 not to hold the Annual Church Dinner in 2021 due to concerns related to increased numbers of cases of the COVID-19 virus and its variants. This year's dinner was to have been a "take out meal event" only. The decision came after much discussion and prayer. Since 1925 church members, neighbors, and friends from the area have enjoyed coming together on the first Saturday in November to enjoy dinners of country ham, roast turkey with all the trimmings, and fried oysters cooked on the church's wood stove. An array of home cooked vegetables, homemade bread, assorted slices of cake, and a warm hospitable welcome have added to each meal making it a delicious dining experience on a crisp autumn Saturday each year.

The Presbyterian Women would like to express their appreciation to all the CPC members, friends, and neighbors who have faithfully supported and enjoyed our Annual Church Dinner in the past. We look forward to welcoming you in 2022 with lots of delicious food, a Bazaar filled with crafts and baked goods, and the warmth of our hospitality.

The two Presbyterian Women Circles began in September the 2021-22 Horizons Bible study entitled "What My Grandmothers Taught Me" by Merryl Blair. There are approximately twenty-five women involved in this year's study between the two groups. Both Circles meet in person at the church. The Night Circle meets the first Thursday of the month at 6:30 p.m. for a light supper followed by the Bible study at 7:00 p.m. The C & F Circle gathers at 1:00 p.m. on the third Tuesday for the Bible Study followed by a hospitality time. During the height of the COVID-19 crisis the Night Circle began airing the monthly Bible



study on Facebook Live and has continued that practice. Those interested in being a part of the virtual study are invited to join the Night Circle on the first Thursday of each month at 7:00 p.m. on the CPC Facebook page.

The ministerial leadership of Collierstown Presbyterian Church is now in transition as Rev. Kevin Channell accepted a call in late August to pastor Petersburg Presbyterian Church in Petersburg,WV. The CPC family celebrated with the Channels their new opportunity for ministry while extending the church family's best wishes at a reception following Rev. Channel's final sermon on September 26.

As the days have become crisper and leaves have turned shades of yellow, orange, and red, the Collierstown congregation has felt the Holy Spirit moving it forward with a renewed commitment to witness to each other and our community. Our leadership and those that have led worship have inspired us to be grounded in God's Word. We have felt a calling to care for each other and our neighbors. There is also a sense of expectancy and excitement as we wait on the Lord to direct our path. He alone is the source of our joy and our strength.

#### Pam Snyder - Leadership Coordinator Report for the Mission Community Coordinators

#### Leadership Coordinator Report August 2021

As a reminder, the role of the newly adopted "Mission Community Coordinators" is to serve as the link between Presbyterian Women in the congregations and the PW Coordinating Team. My role as Leadership Coordinator is to stay connected with the Mission Community Coordinators and help strengthen the PW leaders network within Shenandoah Presbytery. For those of you in the roles of keeping the different congregations connected with PW in the Presbytery, here are a few recommendations to help you, including a few repeats:

#### Continue to connect with the congregational PW moderators

This can be a simple phone call to touch base or send a card or post card reminding them that you are a resource. This is especially important since many congregations have not held in-person PW and circle meetings during the pandemic. Also confirm the current PW leadership contact.

Share information about the current PW Bible Study, the new 2021-2022 Bible Study, What My Grandmothers Taught Me: Learning from the Women in Matthew's Genealogy of Jesus by Merryl Blair. Note the Bible Study training available through Shenandoah Presbytery (this may have been recorded and still available:

Presbyterian Women's Bible Study Overview Saturday August 21, 2021 10 - 11 am, via Zoom

The author says this:

"Reading the first chapter of the Gospel of Matthew...invites us into the family stories that helped shape Jesus and that, therefore, shape us too....As we enter into these stories together, think about your own

family stories...Mathew has named these women [Tamar, Rahab, Ruth, Bathsheba and Mary] for a reason. Their stories will lead us into the Gospel, the Good News about Jesus Christ. My hope is, having explored their stories together, we will have a richer idea of what the good news is."

<u>Share what some other PW groups are doing:</u> When you talk with PW moderators, ask them what they have been doing these past months and share with others. Everyone is looking for a way to provide mission and ministry in their congregations and communities!

<u>For Mission Community Coordinators:</u> Consider hosting a Zoom meeting of all leaders in your Mission Community. I can assist, as can Presbytery staff, in helping deliver a Zoom meeting. Make it a social time, to get to know each and build relationships the first time. Keep it to an hour. Then perhaps build a targeted subject for another Zoom event and focus on recommendations from the Moderators/leaders to help meet their needs. If only 3-4 participate, it is progress. Don't give up!

#### **Moderators Report**

I attended the 2021 Churchwide Triennial Business meeting and also the Gathering event and the installation of officers for the upcoming 3 years by way of Zoom. Since I did work on Wednesday, I did miss a little of the goings on but not items that held a vote.

On the agenda for Thursday was a recommendation to update language regarding people of color as well as the Hispanic community and consideration replacing the word "Kingdom" with "Kin-dom" as it appears in the PW pledge as well as other areas.

The Oughts and the Shoulds: "I don't really want to but I feel I should". How often we hear this from people who appear to be able to determine their own conduct. Are you a victim of "the should"? Do you find yourself drawn into doing things you would rather not do? What can one do at such a point? First, it would be well to pause and consider: what is the "should" related to? Who or what is the force compelling me to do it, or to feel guilty for not doing it? Second, we need to question: is this compulsion in line with what God requires of me?

God has spelled out his requirements for us quite specifically. We are to:

- 1. Fear him (reverence)
- 2. Walk in all His ways
- 3. Love and serve him with our whole heart, soul and mind.

It's worthy of noting that God's requirements for us are given for our good. Can we apply this test to the should and oughts that others impose upon us? What happens when we commit because we feel we have to, no matter how unwilling we are? Usually we feel tension, resentment and other negative emotions toward the person or the situation that has placed us under the "tyranny of the ought." This does not mean we should be irresponsible or careless regarding our duty toward others. We cannot fulfill God's requirements as stated without having right attitudes toward those around us. We need to analyze the should and oughts that tend to drive us. It was never God's intention that we be tyrannized but that we should experience his peace as we seek to meet his requirements for us.

Something to think about the next time you are unreasonable compelled to do something because you feel you should.
