## Associate General Presbyter—Nancy Meehan Yao

### 8 Habits of Evangelism

Many congregations wonder what evangelism looks like, now, for congregations and members. While we want to share the Good News of Jesus Christ, in a changing world, we might not be sure of how to do that. Evangelism has a lot of baggage of people coercing, buttonholing, even boring people, with no effective results. The “urgent call of the church in our time is to make disciples,” per Ray Jones, Director for Theology, Formation and Evangelism, PC(USA).



This past fall, several pastors and leaders of congregations in Shenandoah Presbytery attended the PC(USA) REvangelism conference. Among the many things discussed and discovered, are the 8 Habits of Evangelism.

These habits are things congregations are already engaged in:

Radical Welcome; Worship; Sacraments; Prayer; Justice; Teaching; Fellowship and Generosity.

And these habits are all things that shape and equip us, as congregations, and as individuals, to share the Good News. There are no “scripts,” no pre-made speech to say as we knock on doors and stand on street corners, no 100% guaranteed results for a billboard or a blurb put in the newspaper or on Facebook. Rather, these habits, these practices, shape and nurture us, developing and strengthening in us “a love of God, neighbor and creation...” and by the power of the Holy Spirit, these habits enable us to live out and share the Good News of Christ in our words and in our lives. ### The 1st Habit: The Habit of Radical Welcome:

Radical Welcome is the spiritual practice of embracing and being changed by the gifts, presence, voice and power of The Other: the people who are systematically cast out of or marginalized within a church, denomination or society.

Think for a minute, of your congregation. Who is there? Who is not? Who is in your community, and does not worship with you? Who needs to hear the Good News?

While we might say we are “a friendly church,” we need to ask if what we really are is “a church of friends,” that is, a church that is made up of people like us: people we went to school with/raised kids with/who look like us/agree with us.

The Good News of Jesus Christ calls us to welcome those who are not like us, not in a condescending way, but as equals, as beloved children of God, even as Christ welcomes those at the margins of his life.

Habits for Radical Welcome include:

**Develop a plan that all can participate in.** What is your outreach to the community- all the community? How is your space open, accessible and affirming to all?

**Do not always expect people to come to you.** Rather, find ways to go out and be involved in the community around you.

**Reflect diversity in who leads.** Admittedly, most of our congregations in this Presbytery are not very diverse, in age, race, or background. How can we be more inclusive in who leads/reads/serves in our congregations?

**Do your own work.** Before we can welcome others, we need to examine what biases we have in our own congregations and in ourselves. If our welcome implicitly says “you have to look like us, behave like us, be like us,” that’s not truly welcoming.

**Even if you do not “succeed” not on the first try, do not give up.** You might need to try a variety of things, many different times. Your work is to be open to the Holy Spirit.

Blessings, as we proclaim the goodness of God together!

## Committee on Nominations

Rarely do the number of openings/opportunities to serve on a particular presbytery committee outnumber the currently filled positions. But that is the case, as we begin 2022, for the Committee on Relational Ministry. Chaired by Howard Boswell (Class of 2024), the CRM has four opportunities in each of the Class of 2023 and the Class of 2024.

A special skill set of pastoral concern, congregational empathy, and energy is needed for those who would like to serve on CRM. The CRM has a wide range of responsibilities “related to oversight of congregations and teaching elders in their ministry. These responsibilities include all matters related to matriculation of new pastors, periodic visits with sessions and pastors, support for clergy and Certified Christian Educator wellness and professional development and minimum standards for clergy compensation.” A list of CRM’s specific duties may be easily accessed at the Shenandoah Presbytery website under “Committees”.

Without a full complement of committee members, the CRM faithfully struggles to meet its basic duties, let alone consider new directions for the benefit of the presbytery.

The Nominations Committee implores pastors and ruling elders to prayerfully consider if God is calling them to serve on this committee, or if they may be led to ask someone else in their congregation who seems to have the appropriate gifts for this important committee ministry. We would welcome all suggestions so that we can follow-up with any prospective nominee.

## Refugee Resettlement in the Valley

The Committee on Mission Outreach is happy to report that many evacuees from Afghanistan are being resettled in the Valley with our help. Massanetta Springs Camp & Conference Center will continue to serve as a transitional housing location until mid-February.

We are working with Church World Service, the resettlement agency for our region. They have had a long-standing presence in Harrisonburg and are now in the process of opening a satellite office in Winchester. A coordinating team is working with community volunteers, mostly from area churches, to find housing and jobs, and manage initial orientation and transportation needs. Winchester First is acting as the initial fiduciary agency.

To date, 14 Afghan men and two families have arrived in Winchester. Several of our other churches are continuing their resettlement ministries around Harrisonburg.

This is a significant Mathew 25 effort. Cash donations are important to sustain this on-going effort. Information can be found at [cws-harrisonburg.org](http://cws-harrisonburg.org). Donations specific to the ministry in Winchester should be sent to First Presbyterian Church, designated for Refugee Resettlement. CMO will keep you posted as we grow this immediate, vital ministry. ## Disaster Kits Needed AGAIN

Church World Service continues to be in need of disaster kits, particularly the hygiene and cleanup buckets. The past disasters have greatly reduced the stockpile of kits at CWS warehouses. Having those kits available for immediate distribution has helped those in need and allowed everyone to respond quickly.

Even now during this resurgence of the omicron COVID strain, we need to prepare for future needs of these kits. The Presbytery's Disaster Preparedness and Response Team suggests we all make plans now to collect and when possible, to assemble kits to provide help with some basic human needs such as those found in hygiene kits, school kits, and cleanup buckets.

As we have done before, let us join together "virtually" to provide disaster kits. You may wish to send the funds in to purchase the supplies for some kits, or you can assemble the kits yourselves. The details about all three kits can be found at the Church World Service Kits site at <https://cwskits.org/>. At this website you will find a list of contents and assembly instructions, the cost of each kit if you wish to purchase them, and where to deliver or ship the kits.

We have a CWS Kit Depot located right here in our presbytery at the Church of the Brethren District office in Weyers Cave, VA. You can call to make arrangements for delivery there by calling (540)447-0306. If you wish to deliver or ship them, the address is 1453 Westview School Road, Weyers Cave, VA 24486.

Kits can also be shipped or delivered to the New Windsor, MD warehouse at: CWS, Brethren Service Center, 601 Main Street, New Windsor, MD 21776.

Because of very limited times when the Presbytery office is open, we are now encouraging everyone to deliver kits directly to the CWS warehouses.

Thank you in advance for continuing to stand alongside our neighbors in this special way.

A letter from Addisu Chanalo, a student sponsored through this Presbytery's Ethiopian Partnership:

Dear my foster family!!

First and foremost, I want you all to know this letter isn't even half of the neither words nor emotions I have towards you all. I don't tell you enough how much I love you! My story has been rocking, emotional, but it's my story. From the moment I walked in gore hostel 4 years ago to join university and I'm stayed three years in university and today I am graduated my first degree by criminology and criminal justices two months ago from Gondar university and again after my graduation I am started my second degree in Ethiopian police university by competition and today I am employer at Ethiopian police university and at the same time I am started my masters degree at that university , you treated me as your own when I am in the university up to today. You've taught me so many things along the road of this journey called life.



You changed my life in ways I am never understood. Many times kids who grow up in foster care want to feel loved, accepted and understood. All of that came natural from you guys. Not once did I ever feel out of place or unwelcome. I've always known that y'all were my family, and I couldn't let go. See, the difference you made in my life isn't something that stopped when I turned 18. We have formed a bond just like any other family. I call you about some of my issues but not all of them, because I want to be independent from the family. I know that at the end of the day, I can always turn to you. You are my parents, not my "foster" parents; nothing about our relationship was just you fostering me. You took me in when I had no other placements, especially after you were done doing foster care, not because you had to, but because you loved me.

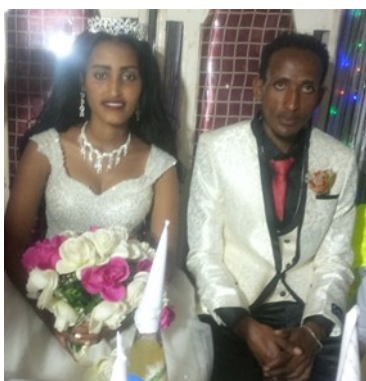
I have felt alone sometimes, but you have been there to catch me when I fall and when I felt sad. You taught me that it's okay to sad, and sometimes being sad. aren't the worst thing in the world. Not only did you love me, but you gave a forever family. Yes, sometimes we get on each other's nerves, but what family doesn't. I never knew what it was like to have parents until I moved in with you guys. My wonderful parents have been there through thick and thin when they don't understand what struggles or life issues that I face on a day-to-day basis. Y'all have taught and loved me so much that I can't put in words. Just know there is no way I can repay you for the endless love, support and times we spend as a family.

Over the years, I have had some obstacles, but you have been there for me through everything. I'm honored and blessed to know that you choose me. Recently, everything in my life changed. I received an amazing job opportunity in Ethiopian Police University. For the two years, but before that, my biological mother died. You've been there for me in ways I can't even understand. I'm forever grateful for you! I appreciate everything you've done for me! You are literally the best and only mom and dad I've ever had!

Thank you for supporting all of my hopes, dreams and wishes especially supporting me when I do dumb stuff! You've taken me in like your own and I'll forever be grateful for that! You deserve the world!

My unchangeable God be with you and I wish to you long live plus my today's life always bless you and my love to you doesn't have end forever

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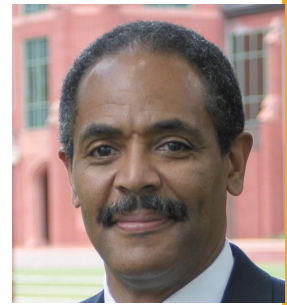


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## Brian Blount, President of Union Presbyterian Seminary, to Preach at Trinity Presbyterian Church February 20
