GOD AND THE PANDEMIC

God and the Pandemic—Part 3

NT Wright's book *God And The Pandemic* has caused great conversation on Tuesday nights. Chapter 1 focused us on the "What" question – What do we as Christian do in response to events like the pandemic? Chapter 2 invited us to ask

the questions "How is God active in the world?" and "Who has been a Jesus figure for us in our lives?" Which then led us directly into Chapter 3 and a discussion of who Jesus is, and why He is so important in our lives. Wright says Jesus is "standing at a moment of great transition" in our lives and in the history of the world.

Chapter 3 is all about Jesus. Wright makes the claim that Jesus is the sign of what God is doing in the world. Not COVID. Not forest fires. Not political unrest. Jesus is the filter through which all of us should view the activity of God today. Which then led us to four statements that seem to capture what Wright is saying about the importance of Jesus today:

#1 - The kingdom of God is here NOW.

Not when we die. Not in heaven. Right now!! The kingdom of God is breaking through into the fabric of our ordinary lives.

#2 - Jesus is the model of what kingdom living is all about.

If you want to know more about how life in God's new kingdom is to be lived, look at Jesus. Look at how He lived, how He treated people, how He prioritized His life.

#3 - When we live like Jesus, we join Him in being kingdom builders.

When we live the way He lived, we seize moments of opportunity and reflect the kingdom's presence.

#4 - When we don't live like Jesus, we are punished not FOR our sins but BY our sins. Actions have consequences. So do inactions. And when we live counter to how Jesus taught us to live, we cause great pain to ourselves, each other, and the world God created.

Says Wright - "If God wants to alert us to things that are wrong in the way we have been running the world – and that seems to me highly likely - they will come to us Jesus shaped." -Pastor Dave

INSPIRITUS Disaster Relief is on the Ground in Alabama

Over the weekend, the Inspiritus Disaster Relief response team moved from Southwest Louisiana to their new volunteer camp at The Island Church in Orange Beach, Alabama. Orange Beach is an area where Hurricane Sally, a Category 2 hurricane, caused significant destruction last week. Orange Beach received over 29.99 inches of rain, similar to nearby Pensacola, which received 24.80 inches. Inspiritus (formerly Lutheran Services of Georgia) is working closely with the Southeastern Synod of the ELCA to assess the communities most in need of our assistance.

Those being served are experiencing multiple disasters at the same time: COVID-19, Hurricane Laura, and now Hurricane Sally. Through your generosity and support, Inspiritus is bringing hope to the people who need it most. Thank you for your donations. Your help during the early days of a disaster is critical.
