#### **Luther's Other Reformation - The Common Chest**

A while back, Church Council Vice President Catherine Strate wrote an excellent paper for her studies at Candler School of Theology on Martin Luther's Town's Community Chest. Through her work I was reminded that this was more than a space on the Monopoly board but a way to join God's work of caring for the most vulnerable among us. Catherine has graciously reworked and condensed her paper for publication as a three part series in LCR's Weekly. In Part 1 we heard about the theological basis for the community chest, now in Part 2 we'll hear about how it took shape. — Pr. Stephen Friedrich



This is a picture of the original Wittenberg Common Chest that is on display in the "Black Monastery" which was Martin Luther's and Katherine von Bora's home. There were three different locks. The representatives from the different societal sections had to all be present with their keys to open the chest, evaluate the requests for financial assistance, and distribute the money. This was done every Sunday morning at 11:00 am.

#### Part 2 – Organizing God's Mission: Luther's Other Reformation – The Common Chest

In 1519-1520, in collaboration with the Wittenberg town council, Luther authored a program that regulated public assistance to the poor, "The Order of the Communal Purse."

#### Wittenberg Ordinance of the Communal Purse – 1519

Income from churches, brotherhoods, and guilds were to be collected and brought to the **community chest for poor relief**;

**Beggars were not to be tolerated** in the city; all were encouraged to work or leave the city; Monks were not allowed to beg. Instead they were expected to live off the income of their hands;

**Interest-free loans were to be given to poor artisans**. If the artisan was unable to repay his loan, the debt would be forgiven for God's sake;

The infirmed, elderly, orphaned, widowed, or otherwise impoverished would be provided for:

**Re-financing of high-interest loans** for those who were burdened at no higher than 4-5% annual rate:

Vocational training for boys of the poor was to be provided until such time as they were able to work and provide for themselves;

If an **impoverished or orphaned young boy** showed educational promise, the **costs of schooling would be subsidized**;

**Dowries for girls who were in need** of an appropriate sum for marriage **were provided**.

As you consider this list, which items surprised you? I was struck by the number of these items that continue to be a need even in 2020. The series concludes next week with Part 3 – Extending God's Mission. – Pr. Stephen
