

#### Part 3 – Extending God's Mission: Luther's Other Reformation – The Common Chest

A while back, Church Council Vice President Catherine Strate, wrote an excellent paper for her studies at Candler School of Theology on Martin Luther's town's Community Chest. Through her work I was reminded that this was more than a space on the Monopoly board but a way to join God's work of caring for the most vulnerable among us. Catherine has graciously reworked and condensed her paper for publication as a three part series in LCR's Weekly. In Part 1 we heard about the theological basis for the community chest, and in Part 2 we'll hear about how it took shape. Now in Part 3 we'll hear a few examples of how these ideas spread to other towns and countries through the years . - Pr. Stephen Friedrich

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#### Part 3 - Extending God's Mission: Luther's Other Reformation - The Common Chest—Continued

In 1519-1520, in collaboration with the Wittenberg town council, Luther authored a program that regulated public assistance to the poor, "The Order of the Communal Purse." The work done in Wittenberg spread.

**Additional Developments** of Common Chest programs that were adopted by the towns:

- The development of **social welfare organizations** such as
  - hospitals for the poor and elderly;
  - free medical office for the needy;
  - financial support for public schools and churches
  - ♦ a 'soup kitchen' to feed the needy
  - manage the storage of grains and peas to be distributed during bad harvest years
- Artisans who expanded their shops and offered additional employment opportunities were given interest-free credit of up to 500 gulden;
- Support of a four-year school program for all children, including girls (1525), at almost no cost. Tuition was subsidized based on the family's economic capabilities;
- Paying workers in the churches including schoolteachers; and
- Interest rates should be held at the levels of 4-5% to curb the practice of usury at extreme amounts and at the expense of the poor.

#### Summary

- Agreements were reached and the Common Chest Program was implemented in 27 German towns between 1520 and 1540's;
- Denmark and Norway as nations adopted the Program for their countries by 1537. The Program became part of Denmark's constitutions in 1836;
- City Archives of Wittenberg has the accounting records of the Common Chest. There are unbroken yearly accounts exist from 1524 until 1806;
- Under Bismarck, in 1883 the German Reich legally adopted the view that the state had to protect the community from the 'undeserving' poor, but the state also had to ensure all the help possible for the 'truly needy'.
- After World War II the German government set up their current "Rhenish Capitalism" economic
  system that was developed around Luther's concept that focuses around the responsibility to serve
  people and that a country's economy should be run so that all participants, the owners and the
  workers, should all benefit from their efforts.

Baptized into the saving death and resurrection of Jesus Christ, to quote Catherine, "we become God's human emissaries to fulfill his mission to serve others, specifically the poor." May you be God's human emissaries in all of your relationships and encounters, especially when it concerns the most vulnerable among us.
