Big God Big Questions: The Covenant of Confirmation

Confirmation is rooted in the covenantal relationship between the confirmand and God, supported by the web of relationships among the congregation, mentors, and home. It is a natural setting for intergenerational relationships and activity as young people prepare to proclaim their faith, the faith of their elders, and participate in the life of the faith community. Explore the covenant of Confirmation found in the four questions asked of confirmands, the intergenerational possibilities, and how Big God Big Questions can play a crucial role in your Confirmation program.

CITI Urban Ministry Immersion

Introduction to the Enneagram

The Enneagram is a dynamic system for understanding ourselves and others, and seeing everyone as a beloved child of God.

Unlike many of the more static personality typing models, the Enneagram leads us to deep self-awareness, and personal transformation, helping us discover our true selves, beyond our ego and default behaviors. The Enneagram doesn't put you in a box, but helps you see the box you already inhabit (and offers ways to get out!) The nine ways of experiencing and being in the world articulated by the Enneagram, help us live beyond our knee-jerk, default reactions and behaviors, and engage the world, and ourselves with more compassion and understanding. This one-hour class will introduce you to this wonderful tool. Beware, we can only scratch the surface in 1 hour, but I hope it will spark a desire to begin or continue your own journey of self-exploration and transformation. For adult and youth participants.
